Die Direkteur: Elektriese Ingenieursdienste noem verder dat die departement bewus is van probleme wat met die "ou" 7-syfer voorafbetaaltipe-elektrisiteitsmeters ondervind word en is daar reeds 272 meters nagegaan. Indien die fout nie reggestel kan word nie, bestaan die moontlikheid dat die meters (679 in totaal) vervang sal moet word.

- Dam levels in the Western Cape Water Supply System, which are approximately 10% lower than the same period last year, with the Voëlvlei Dam at 50.9%;
- An unfavourable long-term weather forecast with below-normal rainfall expected up to June 2026;
- Feedback regarding the meeting of the Western Cape Water Supply Monitoring Committee held on 31 March 2026, including maintenance work undertaken by the Department and the decision not to implement water restrictions for the hydrological year.

### **5.1.2 ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING SERVICES**

The Director: Electrical Engineering Services confirmed that the application for tariff increases was submitted to NERSA by 31 March 2026 and that receipt thereof has been acknowledged by NERSA.

The Director: Electrical Engineering Services further stated that the department is aware of problems being experienced with the “old” 7-digit prepaid-type electricity meters, and that 272 meters have already been inspected. If the fault cannot be rectified, there is a possibility that the meters (679 in total) will need to be replaced.

Cllr D G Bess brought it to the attention of the Director: Electrical Engineering Services that problems are experienced with Eskom transformers during the winter months when it rains, and that Eskom should be requested to carry out regular maintenance.

## OPERATION OF ACTIVATED SLUDGE TREATMENT WORKS

Below is comments from the consulting chemists with regards to operational matters of the various waste water treatment works.

### MALMESBURY (82%)

1. An average daily flow of 5 508 m<sup>3</sup>/d was recorded in February (55.1% capacity).
2. An organic load of 8 180 kg COD/d was imposed on the plant (81.8% capacity).
3. The sludge masses had improved but remained fairly low in absolute terms for an MBR plant, establishing a sludge age of only 8 days. This is too short to adequately sustain a viable biomass. Maintain 800 – 900 ml/l solids across both aeration units, by judicious sludge wastage.
4. Plant performance was adequate at both aeration tanks with respect to the removal of organics, but the nitrification of ammonia nitrogen was inhibited throughout. This was largely attributed to under-aeration. Fairly low sludge mass/age most likely further contributed to unsatisfactory plant performance. Furthermore, since oil & grease occasionally enters the plant, there is also a possibility that the diffusers are becoming blocked again.
5. The final effluent complied with the General Limit, except for ammonia nitrogen.
6. Disinfection was satisfactory (177 Faecal Coliforms per 100ml).

### MOORREESBURG (73%)

1. An average daily flow of 1 237 m<sup>3</sup>/d was recorded in February (65.1% capacity).
2. An organic load of 1 379 kg COD/d was imposed on the plant (72.6% capacity).
3. The sludge masses at both aeration tanks were wholly excessive. Maintain 400 – 500 ml/l solids, by increasing sludge wastage from both aeration tanks.
4. Plant performance was adequate across both aeration tanks with regard to the nitrification of ammonia nitrogen and the removal of organics.
5. Both settling tank effluents were of satisfactory chemical quality.
6. The underflow sludge return rates from both settling tanks were adequate. Increase sludge wastage (Waste Activated Sludge) from both settling tanks' sludge return sumps.
7. The chlorine residuals were slightly high. Maintain 0.25 mg/l free chlorine. Disinfection was complete (<1 Faecal Coliforms per 100ml).
8. The final effluent complied with the General Limit, except for free chlorine.

### DARLING (145%)

1. An average daily flow of 1 909 m<sup>3</sup>/d was recorded in February, exceeding the hydraulic design capacity (141% capacity).
2. An organic load of 2 260 kg COD/d was imposed on the plant, exceeding the organic design capacity (145% capacity).
3. Both aerators serviceable and operating. The sludge mass remained fairly low in absolute terms, establishing a sludge age of only 5 days. Suspend sludge wastage in the interim. Maintain 900 -1000 ml/l solids.

4. Plant performance improved in the aeration basin, the nitrification of ammonia nitrogen being satisfactory. Removal of organics was also satisfactory.
5. The settling tank effluent was of adequate chemical quality.
6. The underflow sludge return rate was satisfactory.
7. The final effluent complied with the General Limit, relevant to parameters measured. Final effluent 2 (reed bed) complied with the Irrigation Limit up to 500 m<sup>3</sup>, relevant to parameters measured.
8. The chlorine residuals were satisfactory. Disinfection was adequate (56 Faecal Coliforms per 100 ml).
9. The Irrigation Limit up to 500 m<sup>3</sup>, which applies to final effluent 2 (reed bed), does not specify compliance criteria for free chlorine. Disinfection was complete at final effluent 2 (<1 Faecal Coliforms per 100ml).

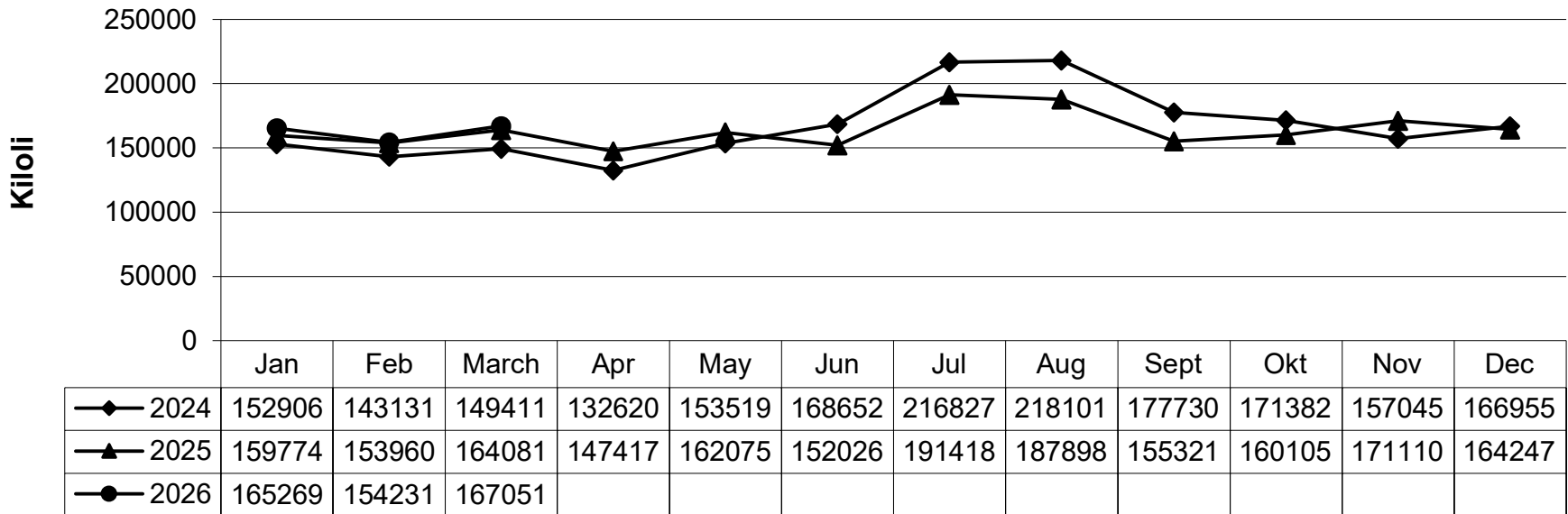
#### **RIEBEEK VALLEI (72%)**

1. An average daily flow of 1 086 m<sup>3</sup>/d was recorded in February (72.4% capacity).
2. An organic load of 285 kg COD/d was exerted on the plant (19.0% capacity).
3. The sludge mass was marginally low in absolute terms at the aeration tank. Maintain 400 – 500ml/l solids, by judicious sludge wastage.
4. Plant performance was satisfactory in the aeration basin relative to the nitrification of ammonia nitrogen and removal of organics.
5. Both settling tank effluents were of sufficient chemical quality. The underflow sludge return rates were satisfactory.
6. The chlorine residuals were very low. Maintain 0.25mg/l free chlorine. Disinfection was nevertheless adequate (96 Faecal Coliforms per 100ml).
7. The final effluent complied with the General Limit, relevant to parameters measured.

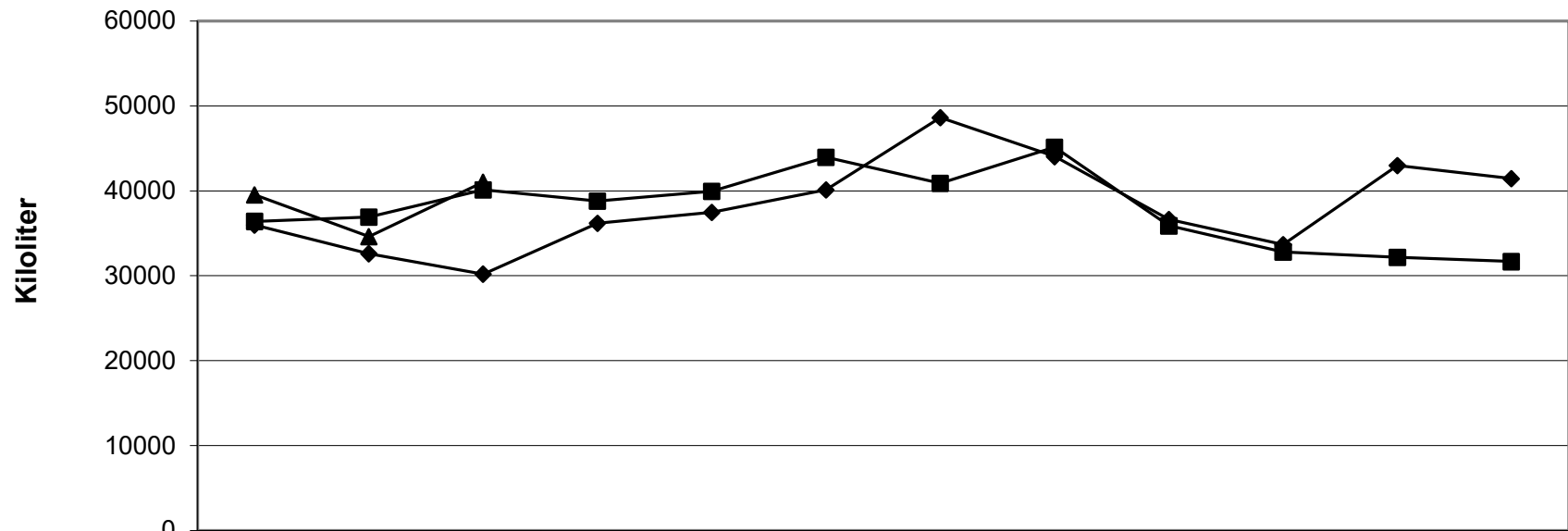
# Malmesbury WWTW Effluent 2024 - 2026

# Moorreesburg WWTW Effluent 2024 - 2026

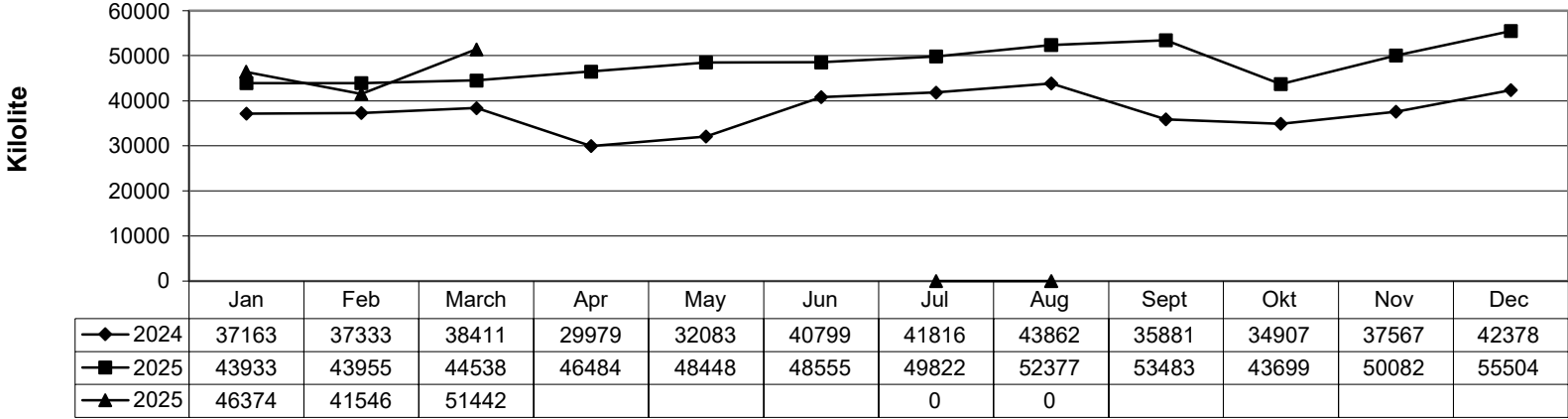

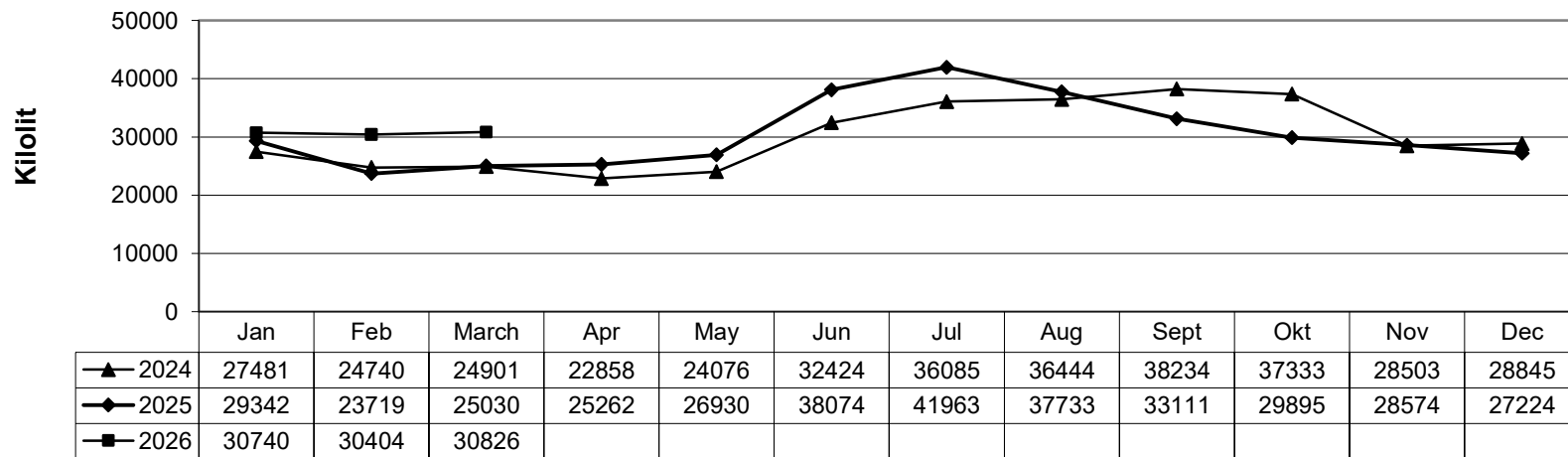

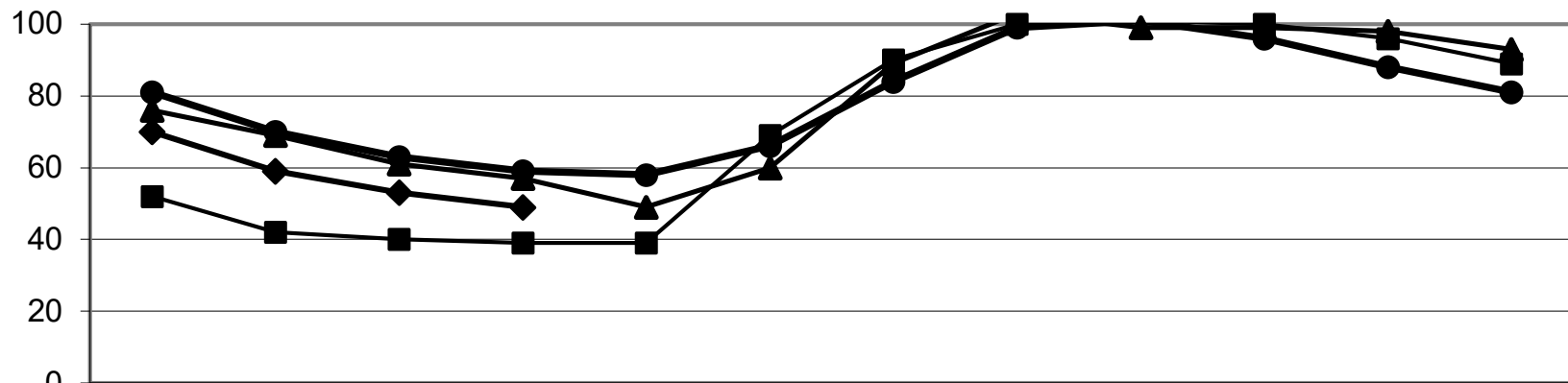
# Riebeek Valley WWTW Effluent 2024 - 2026

# Voëlvlei Dam Storage 2023 - 2026

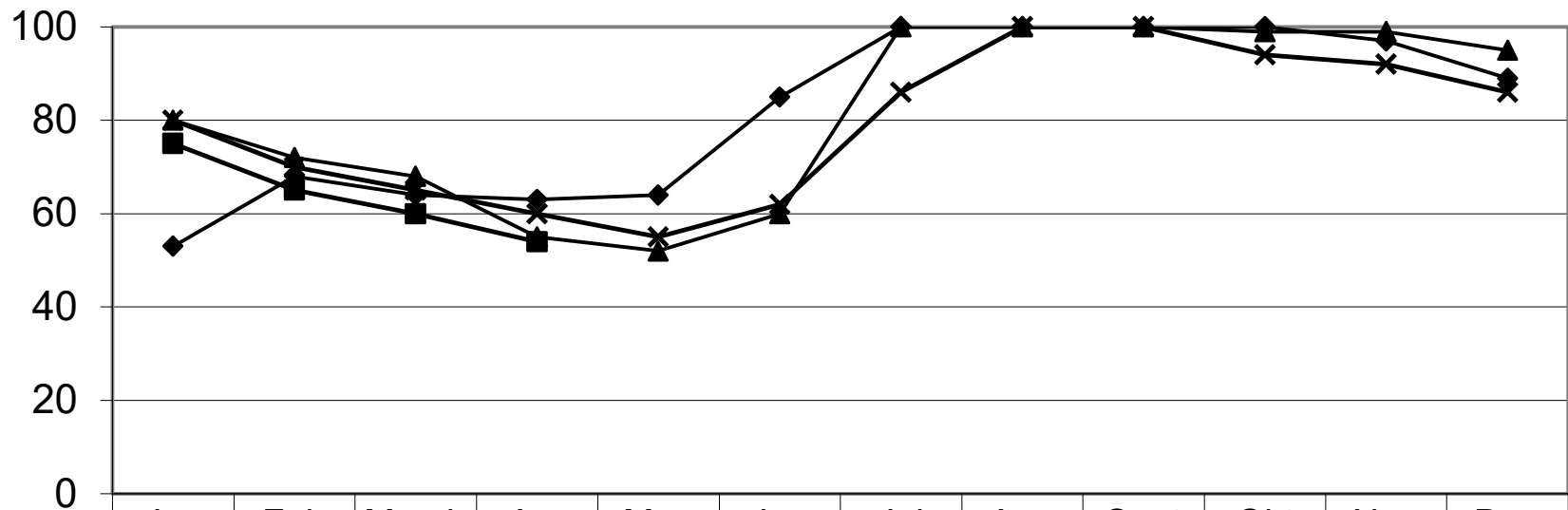

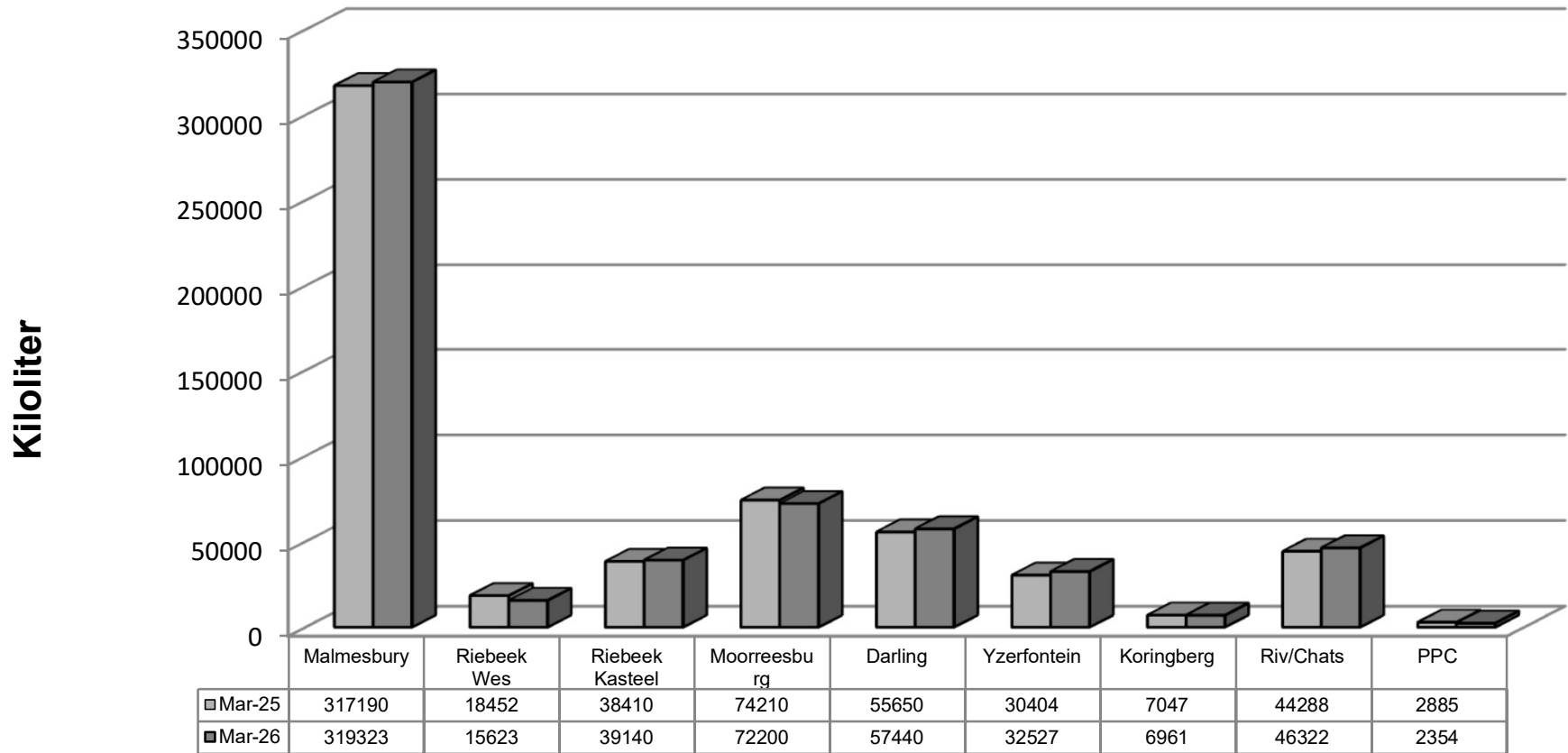

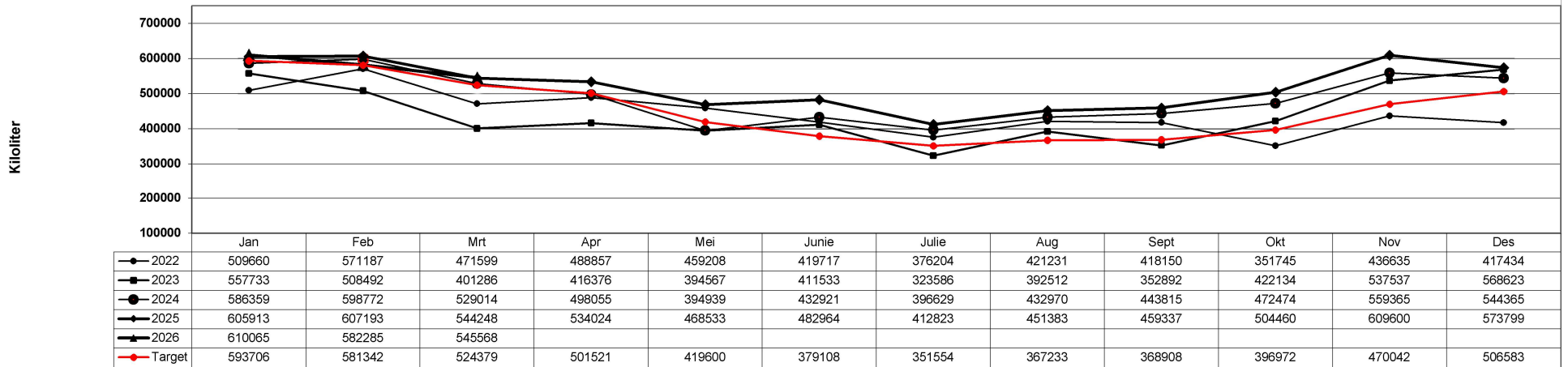

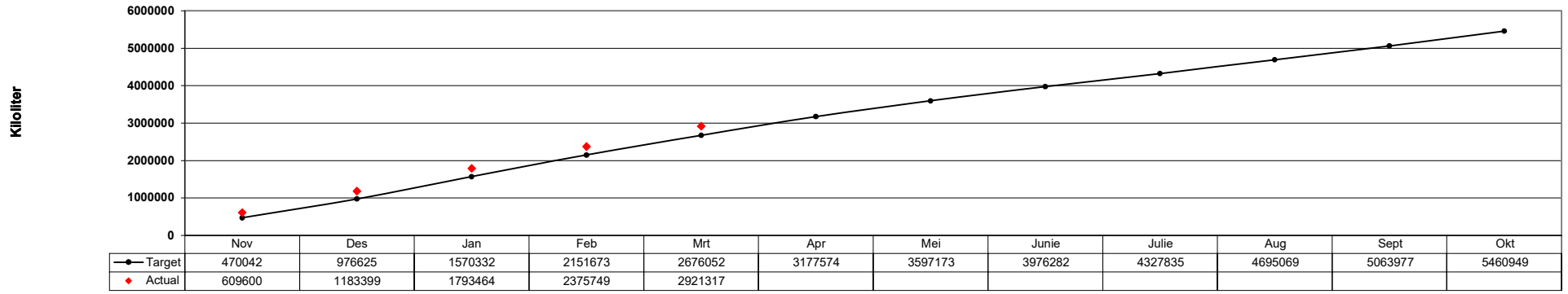
**Water demand March Graph 4**



Water Usage: Swartland 2022 - 2026 Graph 5.1

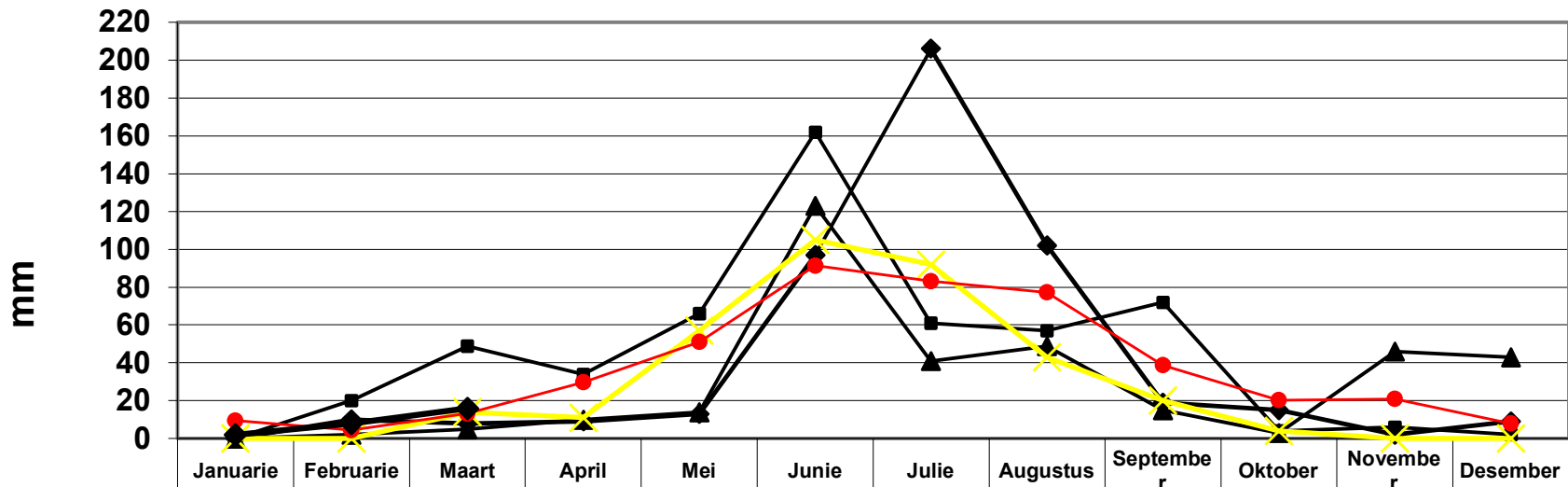


Water Usage: Target vs Actual Graph 5.2

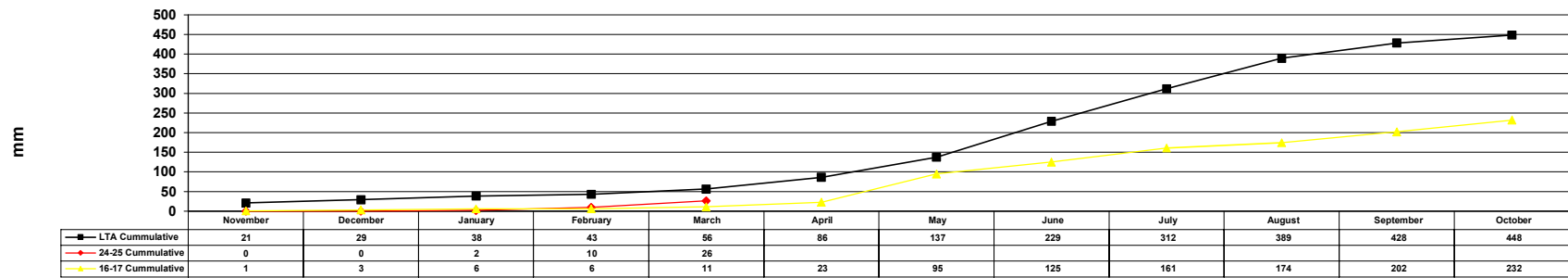

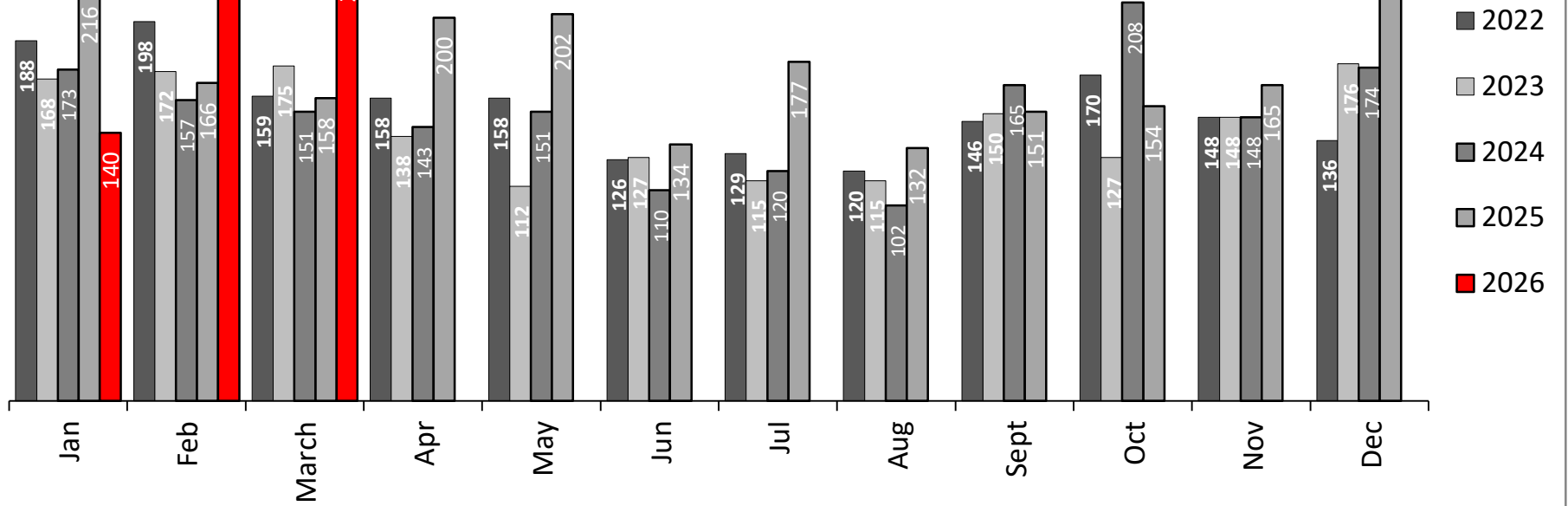

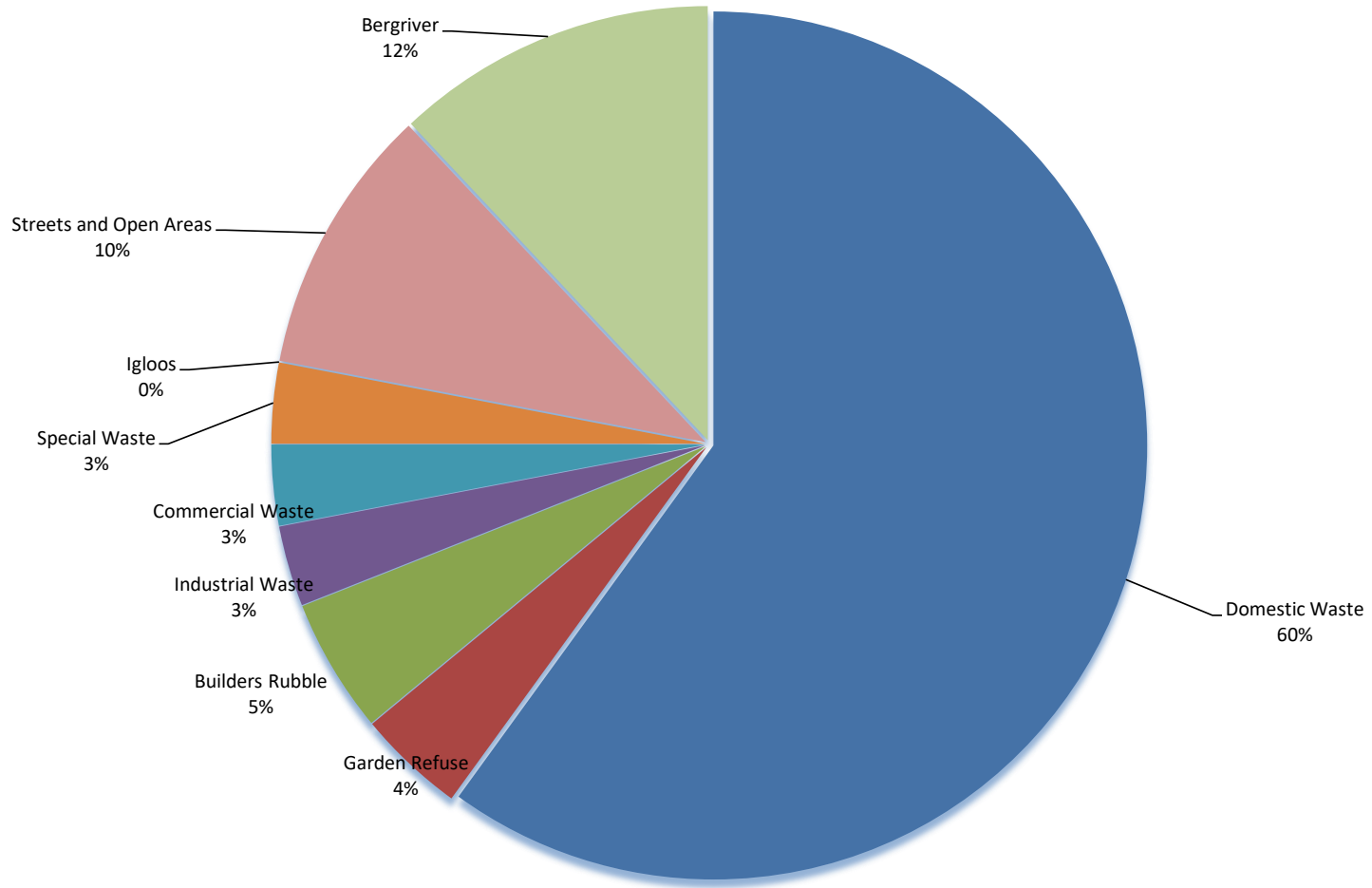

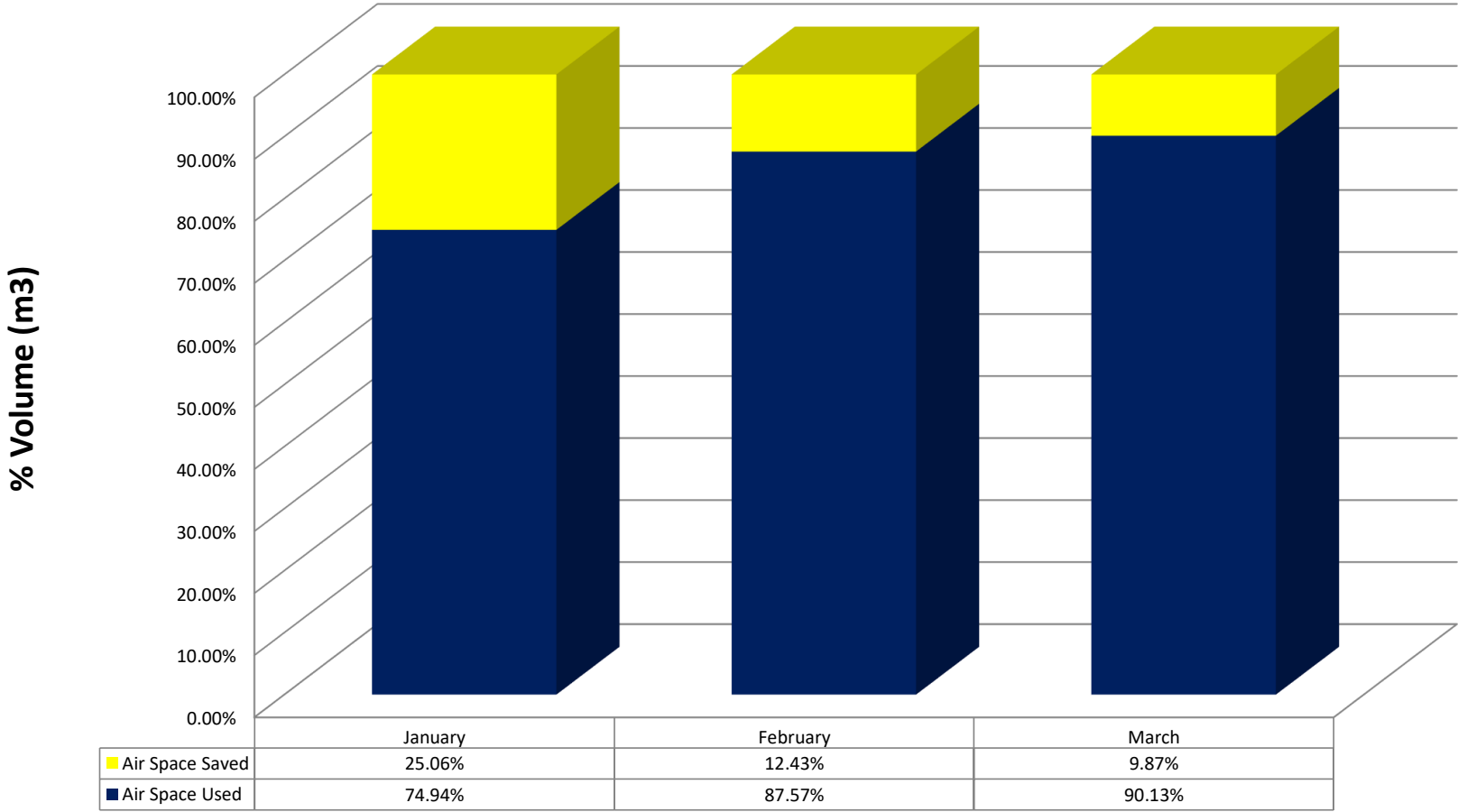

**HIGHLANDS LANDFILL: COMPILATION OF REFUSE RECEIVED - MARCH 2026**

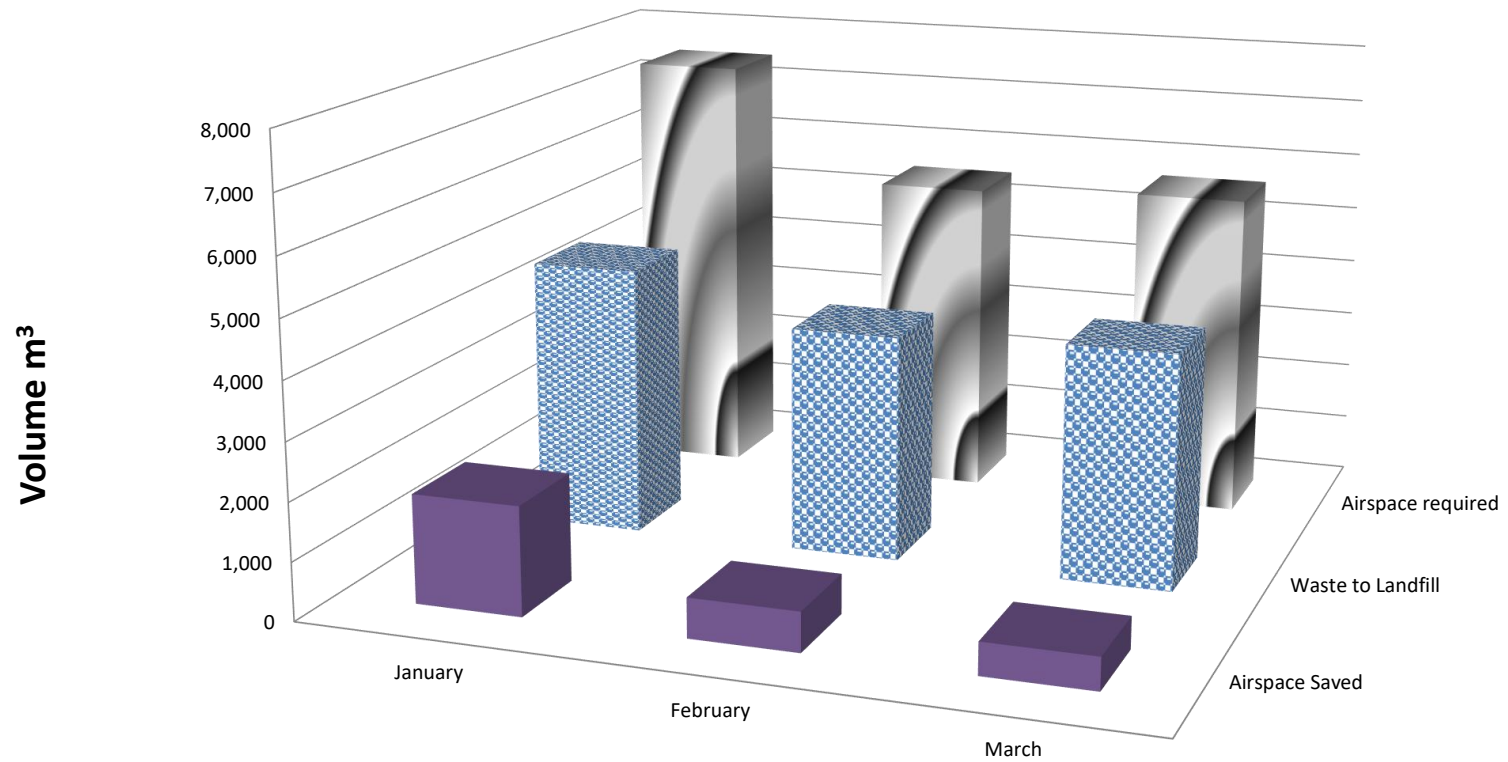

The Director: Development Services stated that councillors, and especially ward councillors, are aware of the processes to be followed in the handover of houses, and that discussions had indeed taken place with the relevant individuals.

Cllr M Ngozi indicated that there is uncertainty regarding the total number of housing opportunities to be created. The Director: Development Services confirmed that the following housing opportunities are included in the respective budgets, namely:

- 2025/2026 financial year = 166 by the end of June 2026;
- 2026/2027 financial year = 413.

The Director: Development Services further stated that although the total housing opportunities (3,036 in total) have been approved by the Province, it may occur (as in the past) that there could be a reduction in funding from the Province. Another aspect to consider is whether sufficient bulk services are available. FLISP housing opportunities (for persons with an income of >R3,500) will be created in the next phase, and councillors will be consulted regarding the processes to be followed to identify beneficiaries.

Cllr M Ngozi requested that the replacement of asbestos roofs be identified as a priority in order to obtain funding from the Province for this purpose.

The Director: Civil Engineering Services confirmed, in response to an enquiry from Cllr D G Bess regarding the implementation of the recommendations in the Zutari report concerning the Riverlands disaster, that the medium-term measures to control the flow of outlets at the dams will be completed before winter.

The Director: Development Services recommended that the request from Cllr M Ngozi to expand the Ilinge Lethu Thusong Centre to accommodate increased service delivery be referred to Ward 9’s Area Plan as a priority.

**Dahlia Centre: GBVF Focus**

There is a growing need to support victims of gender-based and domestic violence in the Swartland Municipal area. In response, the municipality are focussing on a preventative programme and already appointed Gender Based Violence (GBV) Ambassadors in all the wards. These ambassadors work closely with government departments, community stakeholders, and private organisations to ensure victims receive the support they need.

Through a series of community engagement sessions, concerns were raised around domestic violence, harassment, alcohol abuse, and general safety. From these discussions, a clear need emerged: the establishment of an accessible, safe space where victims could find immediate support and counselling.

The primary goal of this safe space is to assist individuals and families who have experienced any form of violence, especially gender-based and domestic abuse. It offers a safe, supportive environment where victims can begin to regain control over their lives, build resilience, and feel empowered to move forward.

The Dahlia Centre, is a municipal property located in Wesbank, Malmesbury, near Ilingeletu. The building is being transformed into a welcoming, first point of contact for victims—offering access to essential services such as social support, healthcare, and law enforcement when needed.

The facility will be managed by a Swartland Municipality employee, qualified as a social worker. In addition, the aim is to appoint two suitable workers from the Expanded public works programme (EPWP) to serve as assistants, further supporting the social worker and contributing to the day-to-day operations of the facility.

#### 4. MINUTES

##### 4.1 MINUTES OF A MUNICIPAL PLANNING TRIBUNAL MEETING HELD ON 11 MARCH 2026

##### RESOLUTION

(proposed by Ms C Havenga, seconded by Mr C Rabie)

That the minutes of a Municipal Planning Tribunal Meeting held on 11 March 2026 are approved and signed by the chairperson.

#### 5. MATTERS ARISING FROM MINUTES

#### 6. MATTERS FOR CONSIDERATION

##### 6.1 PROPOSED REMOVAL OF RESTRICTIVE CONDITIONS, CONSENT USE AND DEPARTURE OF DEVELOPMENT PARAMETERS ON ERF 310, YZERFONTEIN (15/3/4-14, 15/3/5-14, 15/3/10-14) (WARD 5)

Mr H Olivier, as author, gave background to the application for removal of restrictive conditions on Erf 310, Yzerfontein to remove the restriction of the number of residential units.

It is the intention of the owner to erect a double dwelling and therefore the application for a consent use as the second dwelling (69 m<sup>2</sup> in extent) is larger than <60 m<sup>2</sup> as required.

The application for the departures from the development parameters on Erf 310, Yzerfontein is not supported as the stated need by the applicant can be accommodated without relaxation.

## **RESOLUTION**

- A. The application for the removal of title deed restrictions on Erf 310, Yzerfontein, be approved in terms of Section 70 of the Swartland Municipality: Municipal Land Use Planning By-Law (PG 8226 of 25 March 2020), in order to remove the restrictive conditions C.I.3 registered in Title Deed T65461/1994, subject to the conditions that:

### **A1 TOWN PLANNING AND BUILDING CONTROL**

- (a) The restrictions to be removed read as follows:

*“... C I. 3. That not more than one dwelling, together with the necessary outbuildings and appurtenances be erected on the erf...”.*

- (b) The applicant/owner applies to the Deeds Office to amend the title deed in order to reflect the removal of the restrictive conditions;
- (c) The following minimum information be provided to the Deeds Office in order to consider the application, namely:
- (i) Copy of the approval by Swartland Municipality;
  - (ii) Original title deed, and
  - (iii) Copy of the notice which was placed by Swartland Municipality in the Provincial Gazette;
- (d) A copy of the amended title deed be provided to Swartland Municipality for record purposes, prior to final consideration of building plans;

- B. The application for the consent use on Erf 310, Yzerfontein, in terms of Section 70 of the Swartland Municipality: Municipal Land Use Planning By-Law (PG 8226 of 25 March 2021), be approved, subject to the conditions:

### **B1 TOWN PLANNING AND BUILDING CONTROL**

- (a) The consent use authorizes a double dwelling house, as presented in the application;
- (b) The double dwelling adheres to the applicable development parameters and the lower ground level not be used as a third dwelling unit;
- (c) Building plans be submitted to the Senior Manager: Development Management for consideration and approval;
- (d) Any revised design comply with applicable building lines or be re-applied for, together with any previously omitted building line deviations. The new application be subject to a new public participation process to the satisfaction of the Senior Manager: Development Management;

### **B2 WATER**

- (a) A single water connection be provided and that no additional connections will be provided;

### **B3 SEWERAGE**

- (a) The property be provided with a conservancy tank of minimum 8 000 litre capacity and that the tank be accessible to the municipal service truck via the street;

### **B4 DEVELOPMENT CHARGES**

- (a) The development charge towards the supply of regional bulk water amounts to R 12 263, 60 and is for the account of the owner/developer at building plan stage. The amount is due to the Swartland Municipality, valid for the financial year of 2025/2026 and may be revised thereafter (mSCOA: 9/249-176-9210);
- (b) The development charge towards bulk water reticulation amounts to R1 114, 35 and is payable by the owner/developer at building plan stage. The amount is due

- to the Municipality, valid for the financial year of 2025/2026 and may be revised thereafter (mSCOA 9/249-174-9210);
- (c) The development charge towards sewerage amounts to R 5 584, 40 and is payable by the owner/developer at building plan stage. The amount is due to the Municipality, valid for the financial year of 2025/2026 and may be revised thereafter (mSCOA 9/240-184-9210);
  - (d) The development charge towards wastewater treatment amounts to R 13 549, 30 and is for the account of the owner/developer at building plan stage. The amount is payable to the Municipality, valid for the financial year of 2025/2026 and may be revised thereafter (mSCOA 9/240-183-9210);
  - (e) The development charge towards streets amounts to R 7 632, 55 and is payable by the owner/developer at building plan stage. The amount is due to the Municipality, valid for the financial year of 2025/2026 and may be revised thereafter. (mSCOA 9/249-188-9210);
  - (f) The development charge towards electricity amounts to R 11 927, 67 and is payable by the owner/developer at building plan stage. The amount is payable to the Municipality, valid for the financial year of 2025/2026 and may be revised thereafter (mSCOA 9/253-164-9210);
  - (g) The Council resolution of May 2025 makes provision for a 55% discount on development charges to Swartland Municipality. The discount is valid for the financial year 2025/2026 and may be revised thereafter.

C. The application for departure of the development parameters on Erf 310, Yzerfontein, be refused in terms of Section 70 of the Swartland Municipality: Municipal Land Use Planning By-Law (PG 8226 of 25 March 2020) for the reasons as set out below;

D. **GENERAL**

- (a) The approval does not exempt the applicant from adherence to all other legal procedures, applications and/or approvals related to the intended land use, as required by provincial, state, parastatal and other statutory bodies.
- (b) Should it be determined necessary to expand or relocate any of the engineering services to provide the development with connections, said expansion and/or relocation will be for the cost of the owner/developer;
- (c) The approval is valid for a period of 5 years, in terms of section 76(2) of the By-Law from date of decision. Should an appeal be lodged, the 5-year validity period starts from the date of outcome of the decision against the appeal;
- (d) All conditions of approval be implemented before the new land uses come into operation/or occupancy certificate be issued and failing to do so the approval will lapse. Should all conditions of approval be met within the 5-year period, the land use becomes permanent, and the approval period will no longer be applicable.
- (e) The applicant/objectors be informed of the right to appeal against the decision of the Municipal Planning Tribunal in terms of section 89 of the By-Law. Appeals be directed, in writing, to the Municipal Manager, Swartland Municipality, Private Bag X52, Malmesbury, 7299 or by e-mail to swartlandmun@swartland.org.za, within 21 days of notification of the decision. An appeal is to comply with section 90 of the By-Law and be accompanied by a fee of R5 000,00 to be valid. Appeals that are received late and/or do not comply with the requirements, will be considered invalid and will not be processed;

E. In terms of the removal of restriction application the proposal is supported for the following reasons:

- (a) It is determined that the restrictive condition serves a legitimate purpose, namely regulating dwelling numbers to protect the coordinated character of the township. Its purpose has been fully considered and acknowledged, and the Municipality accepts that such conditions carry reciprocal rights for all property owners in the township. However, in this particular case, the extent to which the condition continues to provide material benefit to surrounding property owners is limited, as all other protective mechanisms, such as height, coverage, building lines, and general development parameters, remain fully applicable under the development management scheme;

- (b) The removal of the restriction does not result in a significant deprivation of rights of neighbouring affected properties;
  - (c) The social benefit of retaining the restriction is limited, as dwelling-number controls no longer function as the primary mechanism for protecting neighbourhood character. That role is now fulfilled by uniform zoning parameters. Retention would therefore not meaningfully enhance public interest beyond what the development management scheme already regulates. Neighbouring owners continue to enjoy all remaining restrictions in the title deed as well as the full protection of the zoning scheme;
  - (d) Removal of the condition enables the applicant to apply for a land use (double dwelling) that is expressly contemplated as a consent use under Residential Zone 1 and is consistent with the spatial planning instruments of the Municipality and Province. This supports efficient use of serviced urban land, aligned with the applicable spatial policy and SPLUMA principles;
- F. In terms of the consent use application the proposal is supported for the following reasons:
- (a) The use is compatible with the predominantly residential character and represents context-appropriate densification supported by the policy direction toward compact growth as contained in municipal, district as well as provincial Spatial Development Frameworks;
  - (b) A double dwelling is accommodated as a consent use under Residential Zone 1 of the development management scheme;
  - (c) The development proposal supports the optimal utilisation of the property as well as the use of existing municipal engineering services;
  - (d) The second dwelling provides in a need for a larger variety of housing opportunities to the wider population;
  - (e) The development proposal will not negatively impact on the character of Yzerfontein;
  - (f) The development will not have a significant impact on traffic volumes or safety, and with sufficient on-site parking being provided the proposed access from Junction Road as well as Main Street is deemed safe and appropriate for a residential use;
  - (g) No substantiated, policy-based objection was lodged against the land use itself; objections targeted the departures;
- G. In terms of the application for departure of the development parameters:
- (a) The applicant did not demonstrate why compliance cannot reasonably be achieved on-site; the Municipality is satisfied that the stated need can be accommodated without relaxation;
  - (b) The motivation references “established built form” created by unauthorised structures; such works cannot justify new encroachments;
  - (c) The submitted plan indicates an additional side building line shortfall (first-floor main bedroom at 1.37 m vs 1.5 m) that was not included or advertised as part of the application, which independently prevents approving the departures as tabled;
  - (d) Approving non-essential departures where compliance is feasible would unnecessarily erode the orderly application of the development management scheme. The refusal preserves the spatial order intended by building lines without undermining the supported double-dwelling land use.

## **6.2 PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL ON PORTION 35 OF THE FARM JACOBUS KRAAL NO 554, DIVISION MALMESBURY (15/3/3-15, 15/3/10-15) (WARD 5)**

The author, Mr H Olivier, gave the background to the land-uses that was approved since 2017 on Portion 35 of the Farm Jacobus Kraal No 554, Division Malmesbury which included the following:

- Agricultural Zone 1 with consent for 3 additional dwelling units and a tourist facility (1 371m<sup>2</sup> in extent).
- Agricultural Zone 2, limited to an agricultural industry (Gin distillery) of 70m<sup>2</sup> in extent.
- Resort Zone (±2200m<sup>2</sup>).

The owner has since undertaken extensions that exceed the approved areas as well as intends to accommodate new uses as part of the tourism facility and therefore application is made for the amendment of the 2020 approval which relates to:

- Increasing the footprint of the Agricultural Zone 2 zoning from 70m<sup>2</sup> to 194m<sup>2</sup> in extent.
- Increasing the footprint of the Tourist Facility from 1344m<sup>2</sup> to 9265m<sup>2</sup> in extent which includes 2 padel courts.
- Replacement of 2 camping sites with additional cottages under the Resort Zone zoning.

## RESOLUTION

- A. The application for the amendment of conditions A.(1).(a), A.(1).(b) and B.(1).(c) in respect of the approval dated 20 March 2020 pertaining to Portion 35 of Farm Jacobus Kraal No. 554, Division Malmesbury in terms of Section 70 of the Swartland Municipality: Municipal Land Use Planning By-Law (PG 8226 of 25 March 2020), be approved subject to the conditions:

### A1 TOWN PLANNING AND BUILDING CONTROL

- (a) Condition A.(1).(a) - Current text:  
"A portion (70m<sup>2</sup> in extent) of Portion 35 of the farm Jacobuskraal no. 554 (46.6319ha in extent), be rezoned from Agricultural Zone 1 to Agricultural Zone 2, as presented in the application;"

Proposed amendment:

"A portion (194m<sup>2</sup> in extent) of Portion 35 of the farm Jacobuskraal no. 554 (46.6319ha in extent), be rezoned from Agricultural Zone 1 to Agricultural Zone 2, as presented in the application;"

- (b) Condition A.(1).(b) - Current text:  
"A portion (2200m<sup>2</sup> in extent) of Portion 35 of the farm Jacobuskraal no. 554 (46.6319ha in extent), be rezoned from Agricultural Zone 1 to Resort Zone, to accommodate the following, as presented in the application:  
(i) 1 x cottage;  
(ii) 5 x camp sites;  
(iii) 1 x building with ablution facilities;  
(iv) 1 x veranda;  
(v) 1 x area with braai facilities;"

Proposed amendment:

"A portion (2200m<sup>2</sup> in extent) of Portion 35 of the farm Jacobuskraal no. 554 (46.6319ha in extent), be rezoned from Agricultural Zone 1 to Resort Zone, to accommodate the following, as presented in the application:

- (i) 3 x cottages;
- (ii) 2 x camp sites;
- (iii) 1 x building with ablution facilities;
- (iv) 1 x veranda;
- (v) 1 x area with braai facilities;"

- (c) Condition B.(1).(c) - Current text:  
"The consent use for a tourist facility be restricted to 1344m<sup>2</sup>, as presented in the application;"

Proposed amendment:

"The consent use for a tourist facility be restricted to 9265m<sup>2</sup>, as presented in the application;"

- (d) The tourist facility be used only for a restaurant, pub, craft shop, approved padel courts and ancillary facilities;
- (e) The use of the premises for entertainment events, concerts, live or amplified music, conferences, exhibitions, markets or any activity amounting to a place of entertainment or conference facility as defined in the development management scheme is expressly prohibited;

**A2 WATER**

- (a) The farm has an existing connection from the bulk water supply to Yzerfontein. The engineering report indicates that the new additions will increase the monthly consumption by 63.66kl, i.e. 2.09kl/d. For this a development charge in respect of bulk water is payable;

**A3 SEWERAGE**

- (a) The property not be connected to a municipal sewer network and all sewerage generated on the property be disposed of by means of conservancy tanks;
- (b) Conservancy tanks be designed and installed in accordance with an engineer's calculation, taking into account the scale and intensity of the approved uses;
- (c) The tanks:
  - (i) Be of sufficient capacity to prevent overflow;
  - (ii) Be fitted with standard vacuum tanker couplers; and
  - (iii) Be accessible to vacuum tankers, all to the satisfaction of the Director: Civil Engineering Services;
- (d) The owner, at their own cost, appoints a suitably registered and licensed service provider to regularly empty and transport sewage from the conservancy tanks;
- (e) Sewage removed from the property only be disposed of at the municipal wastewater treatment facility in Darling;
- (f) Records of conservancy tank servicing and lawful disposal be kept by the owner and made available to the municipality upon request;

**A4 SOLID WASTE**

- (a) That no refuse collection service will be provided;
- (b) Household solid waste can be disposed of at the nearest landfill site upon payment of the applicable charges;

**A5 DEVELOPMENT CHARGES**

- (a) The development charge applicable to the tourist facility, towards the supply of regional bulk water amounts to R 64 167, 43 and is for the account of the owner/developer at building plan stage. The amount is due to the Swartland Municipality, valid for the financial year of 2025/2026 and may be revised thereafter (mSCOA: 9/249-176-9210);
- (b) The Council resolution of May 2025 makes provision for a 55% discount on development charges to Swartland Municipality. The discount is valid for the financial year 2025/2026 and may be revised thereafter;

**B. GENERAL**

- (a) The approval does not exempt the applicant from adherence to all other legal procedures, applications and/or approvals related to the intended land use, as required by provincial, state, parastatal and other statutory bodies;
- (b) Should it be determined necessary to expand or relocate any of the engineering services to provide the development with connections, said expansion and/or relocation will be for the cost of the owner/developer;
- (c) The approval is valid for a period of 5 years, in terms of section 76(2) of the By-Law from date of decision. Should an appeal be lodged, the 5-year validity period starts from the date of outcome of the decision against the appeal;
- (d) All conditions of approval be implemented before the new land uses come into operation/or occupancy certificate be issued and failing to do so the approval will lapse. Should all conditions of approval be met within the 5-year period, the land use becomes permanent, and the approval period will no longer be applicable;

**C. The application be supported for the following reasons:**

- (a) There are no physical restrictions on the property that will have a negative impact on the proposed application;
- (b) There are no restrictions registered against the title deed of the property that prohibits the proposed land use;

- (c) The proposed expansion of the tourist facility and resort components is broadly consistent with the Provincial SDF (2014), West Coast District SDF (2020), and the Swartland Municipal SDF (2025), all of which encourage: rural economic diversification, farm-based tourism along the R315/Yzerfontein corridor, and amenities such as restaurants, markets, tasting facilities, and eco-tourism activities;
- (d) The proposed padel courts and cottages fall within the range of tourism-related uses anticipated by these frameworks and do not compromise significant biodiversity, high-value agricultural land, or scenic rural landscapes;
- (e) The proposed amendments remain compatible with the existing use rights, provided that the facility is expressly restricted to its lawful rights (restaurant, pub, craft shop, padel, cottages) and not used as a place of entertainment, venue, or event facility, which is otherwise prohibited in terms of the development management scheme;
- (f) The specific condition restricting the use are therefore necessary to bring the land use activity into alignment with the zoning scheme and to prevent unlawful special events;
- (g) The expansion does not compromise agricultural viability (low agricultural potential), affect ecological corridors, or place undue pressure on municipal services;
- (h) The expansion maximizes the efficient use of existing infrastructure and supports rural economic diversification through additional recreational amenities and tourist services. The development contributes to employment and small-scale tourism while remaining subordinate to the primary agricultural character;
- (i) The proposed development is considered desirable, subject to conditions, because the conditions remove the source of harm identified during public participation.

### **6.3 PROPOSED CONSENT USE ON PORTION 1 OF FARM GEMSBOK KUIL NO 582, DIVISION MALMESBURY (15/3/10-15) (WARD 6)**

Mr A J Burger, as author, explained that application is made for a consent use to authorise the operation of a sand mine (5 ha in extent) on Portion 1 of farm Gemsbok Kuil No 582, Division Malmesbury. Mr Burger confirmed that mining as a land use is accommodated as a consent use under the Agricultural Zone 1 zoning.

#### **RESOLUTION**

- A. The application for a consent use on portion 1 of farm Gemsboks Kuil no 582, Division Malmesbury be approved in terms of Section 70 of the By-law, subject to the following conditions:

##### **A1 TOWN PLANNING AND BUILDING CONTROL**

- (a) The consent use authorises mining in the form of a sand mine with a total footprint of 5ha in extent, as presented in the application;
- (b) The mining activity is limited to the extraction of sand, as presented in the application;
- (c) Should any human remains be found during the mining process, SAHRA and Heritage Western Cape must be notified immediately;
- (d) Mining activities be conducted in accordance with the approved Environmental Management Programme and layout plan;
- (e) A social contribution agreement be entered into between the mine owner and the Municipality to be executed and finalised within the duration period of the mining activities;

##### **A2 WATER AND SEWERAGE**

- (a) No municipal drinking water or sewerage services can be provided;

#### **B. GENERAL**

- (a) The owner/developer complies with the conditions of the Environmental Authorisation of the Department of Mineral Resources and Energy, reference number WC30/5/1/3/2/1034MP, dated 9 April 2025;

6.3/B...

- (b) The owner/developer complies with the requirements issued by Department: Water & Sanitation with their letter with reference 16/2/7/G21D/A/8, dated 16 October 2025;
- (c) The approval does not exempt the owner/developer from compliance with all legislation applicable to the approved land use;
- (d) The approval is valid for a period of 5 years, in terms of Section 76(2) of the By-Law, from the date of decision. Should an appeal be lodged, the 5 year validity period starts from the date of outcome of the decision. Should all conditions of approval be met within the prescribed period, the land use becomes permanent and the approval period will no longer be applicable;
- (e) The applicant/objector be informed of the right to appeal against the decision of the Authorized Official in terms of Section 89 of the By-Law. Appeals be directed, in writing, to the Municipal Manager, Swartland Municipality, Private Bag X52, Malmesbury, 7299 or by e-mail to swartlandmun@swartland.org.za, within 21 days of notification of decision. An appeal is to comply with Section 90 of the By-Law and is to be accompanied by a fee of R5 000,00 in order to be valid. Appeals that are received late and/or do not comply with the aforementioned requirements, will be considered invalid and will not be processed;

C. The application be supported for the following reasons:

- (a) An Environmental Authorization and mining permit were granted for the sand mine;
- (b) There are no physical restrictions on the property that will have a negative impact on the mining activities and all possible impacts will be mitigated by the EMP;
- (c) The proposed application is consistent with and not in contradiction to the Spatial Development Frameworks adopted on Provincial, District and Municipal levels;
- (d) Due to the temporary nature of the proposed mining activity as well as the concurrent mining and rehabilitation process that will be implemented, as presented by the applicant, the proposed application will not have a substantial impact on the character of the surrounding area;
- (e) The proposed activity will have a positive economic impact as it will generate income for both the landowner and mine operator as well as contributing to the construction and infrastructure industry;
- (f) It is clear that with the implementation of mitigation measures the agricultural potential of the land will not be jeopardised as the area will be rehabilitated to its pre-mining state;
- (g) With the mitigation measures implemented it is argued that the proposed mining activity will not have an impact on the well-being, health or safety of the surrounding landowners.

#### **6.4 PROPOSED REZONING AND CONSENT USE ON ERF 1327, RIEBEEK KASTEEL (15/3/3-11, 15/3/10-11) (WARD 12)**

The author, Ms A de Jager, stated that Erf 1327, Riebeek Kastell is zoned Residential Zone 1. The area is characterised as low density residential properties larger than 2000 m, earmarked for rural residential purposes.

Ms de Jager explained that application is made for the rezoning of Erf 1327, Riebeek Kasteel from Residential Zone 1 to Residential Zone 5: Rural Residential. The application for a consent use is to accommodate horticulture in hydroponic greenhouse tunnels.

#### **RESOLUTION**

- A. The application for rezoning of a portion of Erf 1327, Riebeek Kasteel, be approved in terms of Section 70 of the Swartland Municipality: Municipal Land Use Planning By-Law (PG 8226 of 25 March 2020);
- B. The application for a consent use on a portion of Erf 1327, Riebeek Kasteel, be approved in terms of Section 70 of the Swartland Municipality: Municipal Land Use Planning By-Law (PG 8226 of 25 March 2020);
- C. Approvals A. and B. are subject to the conditions that:

**C1 TOWN PLANNING AND BUILDING CONTROL**

- (a) A portion of Erf 1327, Riebeek Kasteel,(2 638m<sup>2</sup> in extent) be rezoned from Residential Zone 1 to Residential Zone 5, in accordance with Rezoning Plan MAL/14280/NJdK, as presented in the application;
- (b) The consent use authorises horticulture to be practised in the existing hydroponic greenhouse tunnels on the Residential Zone 5 portion of Erf 1327, as presented in the application;
- (c) The primary use of the Residential Zone 5 portion remains residential (a dwelling) with horticulture as a secondary land use;
- (d) Building plans for the dwelling and the existing hydroponic greenhouse tunnels be submitted to the Senior Manager: Development Management for consideration and approval;
- (e) Application for the display of advertising signs be submitted to the Senior Manager: Development Management for consideration for approval;
- (f) That no retail activities/direct sales of the agricultural product be permitted on Erf 1327, Riebeek Kasteel;
- (g) That electricity generating motors/appliances be located at least 6 m from the property boundary and that said generators be enclosed in a roofed, brick structure;
- (h) That soundproofing measures be applied to the brick structure to the satisfaction of the Senior Manager: Development Management;
- (i) All conditions be complied with within three months of notification of the decision;

**C2 WATER**

- (a) The existing single water connection be used and that no additional connections be provided;
- (b) Only borehole water be used towards the commercial horticultural activities and no municipal drinking water be used;

**C3 SEWERAGE**

- (a) The existing sewerage connection be used and that no additional connections be provided;

**D. GENERAL**

- (a) The approval is valid for a period of 5 years, in terms of Section 76(2) of the By-Law, from the date of decision. Should an appeal be lodged, the 5-year validity period starts from the date of outcome of the decision. Should all conditions of approval be met within the prescribed period, the land use becomes permanent and the approval period will no longer be applicable;
- (b) The applicant/objectors be informed of the right to appeal against the decision of the Municipal Planning Tribunal in terms of section 89 of the By-Law. Appeals be directed, in writing, to the Municipal Manager, Swartland Municipality, Private Bag X52, Malmesbury, 7299 or by e-mail to swartlandmun@swartland.org.za, within 21 days of notification of the decision. An appeal is to comply with section 90 of the By-Law and be accompanied by a fee of R5000-00 to be valid. Appeals that are received late and/or do not comply with the requirements, will be considered invalid and will not be processed.
- (c) The approval does not exonerate the applicant from obtaining any necessary approval from any other applicable statutory authority;

**E. The application be supported for the following reasons:**

- (a) The application complies with the planning principles of LUPA and SPLUMA;
- (b) The application is compliant with the spatial planning of Riebeek Kasteel, as directed by the SDF;
- (c) The proposed rezoning and consent use will complement and not have a negative impact on the residential character of the surrounding area;
- (d) The development proposal supports the optimal utilisation of the property;
- (e) The proposal seeks to obtain formalisation of an existing use on the property;

- (f) The development will utilise existing infrastructure, supplemented with borehole water;
- (g) The structures of the hydroponic greenhouse tunnels are semi-permanent and can easily be demolished, should it be necessary in future;
- (h) The noise impact of the facility on the tranquility of the neighbourhood is addressed through the conditions laid down with regards to noise pollution.

## **6. SAKE VIR AANBEVELINGS AAN DIE UITVOERENDE BURGEMEESTER**

### **6.1 VOORGESTELDE SATELLIET STASIE AAN DIE SUID-AFRIKAANSE POLISIEDIENS (SAPD) BY DIE VOORMALIGE DANCKERTVILLE POSKANTOOR, MALMESBURY (12/1/3/1-8/2)**

Die Raad het op 22 Maart 2023 goedkeuring verleen dat Erf 7516, Malmesbury (die perseel van die voormalige Danckertville Poskantoor) aan die Suid-Afrikaanse Polisiediens (SAPD) beskikbaar gestel word vir die vestiging van 'n satelliet polisiestasie. Intussen het die gebou in onbruik geraak weens vandalisme en is al die strukture deur die Munisipaliteit gesloop.

Die misdaadsyfers in dele van die Swartland, onder andere Wesbank, Ilinge Lethu, Abbotsdale, Kalbaskraal en Chatsworth, het kommerwekkende vlakke bereik. Dit is die mening dat 'n satelliet polisiestasie op Erf 7516, Malmesbury beduidende strategiese en operasionele voordele bied teen die bekamping van misdaad weens die ligging en reaksietyd na voormelde gebiede.

Samesprekings met die SAPD is dus weer geïnisieer en het 'n vergadering op 27 Februarie 2026 plaasgevind. Nadat die Uitvoerende Burgemeester die aanbod van die Munisipaliteit bevestig het, het die SAPD aangedui dat dit nie moontlik sal wees om 'n satelliet polisiestasie te vestig nie, weens die uitdagings wat ondervind word met personeel tekorte. Die SAPD het aangedui dat 17 beamptes benodig word om die skofte van 'n satelliet polisiestasie te behartig, en dit nie haalbaar is nie.

Die SAPD is wel bereid om 'n mobiele polisiestasie (trok waaruit dienste gelewer word en vangwa) beskikbaar te stel wat in samewerking met wetstoepassingsbeamptes in spesifieke areas operasioneel gestel kan word.

### **5.1.1 TRAFFIC AND LAW ENFORCEMENT SERVICES**

The monthly report for February 2026 was tabled by the Chairperson.

Cllr C Pieters enquired about what actions had been taken in an attempt to improve the low pass rate regarding the electronic completion of learner's licence tests. Cllr Pieters further enquired whether assistance is provided to persons who cannot read or write, for example through the oral completion of the learner's licence test and the availability of an interpreter.

The Director: Protection Services confirmed that discussions had taken place with the Department of Mobility to make support tools available for preparation for the electronic learner's licence test. A mobile application is available which can be used to practise for the test, but the website (online practice exercises) referred to by the department is not yet available.

In response to an enquiry from Cllr J R Papier, the Director: Protection Services confirmed that the cameras on the N7 are installed and managed by SANRAL, and that the SAPS and the Municipality can liaise with the latter if information from the cameras is required.

### **5.1.2 FIRE FIGHTING**

The monthly report for February 2026 was tabled by the Chairperson, and the Director: Protection Services provided feedback on the number of Foot-and-Mouth Disease cases (3) and the number of vaccinations already administered on farms in the municipal area.

## **6. MATTERS FOR RECOMMENDATION TO THE EXECUTIVE MAYOR**

### **6.1 PROPOSED SATELLITE STATION FOR THE SOUTH AFRICAN POLICE SERVICE (SAPS) AT THE FORMER DANCKERTVILLE POST OFFICE, MALMESBURY (12/1/3/1-8/2)**

Council approved on 22 March 2023 that Erf 7516, Malmesbury (the site of the former Danckertville Post Office) be made available to the South African Police Service (SAPS) for the establishment of a satellite police station. In the meantime, the building fell into disuse due to vandalism and all structures were demolished by the Municipality.

Crime levels in parts of the Swartland, including Wesbank, Ilinge Lethu, Abbotsdale, Kalbaskraal and Chatsworth, have reached concerning levels. It is believed that a satellite police station on Erf 7516, Malmesbury would offer significant strategic and operational advantages in combating crime due to its location and response times to the aforementioned areas.

Discussions with SAPS were therefore re-initiated, and a meeting was held on 27 February 2026. After the Executive Mayor confirmed the Municipality's offer, SAPS indicated that it would not be possible to establish a satellite police station due to challenges related to staff shortages. SAPS indicated that 17 officers would be required to manage the shifts of a satellite police station, which is not feasible.

SAPS is, however, willing to make a mobile police station (a truck from which services are rendered and which includes a holding cell) available, which can be deployed operationally in specific areas in cooperation with law enforcement officers.

# EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

## 1. INTRODUCTION

The Traffic and Law Enforcement Service of Swartland Municipality are executing our mandate and assisted SAPS to prevent and combat crime during the month of **March 2026**.

Our main purpose is to enhance service delivery and better quality of life through improving the safety of all inhabitants within the Swartland Municipal area.

## 2. LAW ENFORCEMENT

This division ensure bylaw compliance and education to all communities within the Swartland municipal area.

### 2.1. MONITORING OF INFORMAL SETTLEMENTS

The Law Enforcement Division is mandated to monitor all informal settlements within the Swartland municipal area and to prevent and manage land invasion. Monitoring of Silvertown informal settlement, Phase 1/3/4 Ilingeletu, Phola Park, Chatsworth, Riverlands and Sibanye (Moorreesburg) is ongoing. Special efforts are in place to safeguard municipal land. We also monitor Kalbaskraal and all land of Cape Nature in our municipal area as per our MOU. Currently we monitor HDA land in Chatsworth, Ilingeletu and the new housing development at De Hoop as there are land invasion attempts. Our department are currently monitoring the small farmers at De Hoop and share drone footage with Department of Development services. A regular drone report is submitted to management on a regular basis.

### 2.2. DOG UNIT (K9-UNIT)

The Dog-Unit works 8-hour shifts within a 40-hour week. Shifts are adapted to cover enforcement over weekends and assist SAPS with crime prevention and crime combatting activities as per the TPA- agreement. The Unit can report the following for the month:

- 6 x Assisted at K78 Roadblocks / VCP
- 7 x Crime Prevention/Joint Operations

**48** Searches conducted in the form of VCPs, K78-Roadblocks and search and seizure in collaboration with SAPS for the month of **March 2026**. Details are available in this report.

The K9 unit made **(28) Arrests** for the month.

### 2.3 LEAP UNIT

The Unit work 8-hour shifts and adapt their shifts to ensure visibility within Swartland area, assisting SAPS with crime combatting and crime prevention activities for the month of **March 2026**.

- 17x Bylaw Operation
- 15 x Foot Patrols

- 3x Crime Prevention/Joint Operations

## 2.4 ILLEGAL DUMPING OPERATIONS

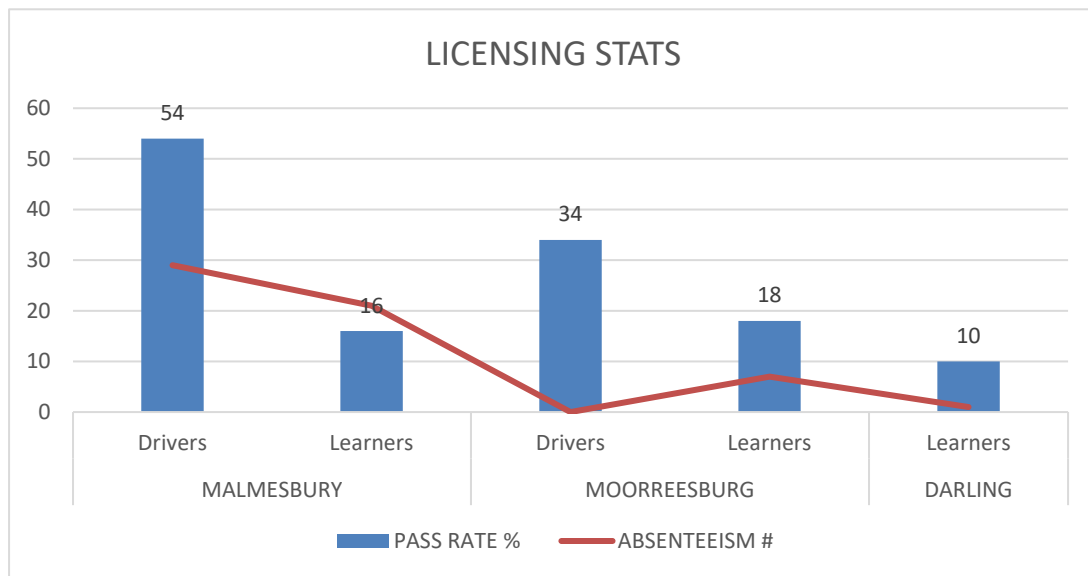
Bylaw awareness campaign held w.r.t illegal dumping is ongoing in the Swartland area making resident aware not to tolerate illegal dumping.

# 3. REGISTRATION AND LICENSING

## 3.1. DRIVING AND LEARNERS' LICENSES

Driving and learners' licenses create job opportunities and allow people to better their standard of living. The following can be reported for Malmesbury, Moorreesburg and Darling Driving License Testing Centres (DLTC's):

**There is currently a significant drop in the passing of learner's licenses as the applicants struggling with the new computerized learner license system. Our department are in the process to print these learner's material for dissemination at libraries as soon as the Mobility department give authorization. This is an effort to support applicants with the process.**

## 3.2 VEHICLE TESTING STATIONS (VTS)

Malmesbury VTS had a total of **67** roadworthy tests, Moorreesburg VTS had a total of **47** roadworthy tests for the month of **March 2026**.

## 4. TRAFFIC DIVISION

The traffic operational division can report the following for the month of **March 2026**.

- Vehicle Check Points (VCP's) = **24**
- Foot Patrols = **134**

Total of **1091** offences recorded for **March 2026** (This includes the cases recorded by Law Enforcement and Traffic).

### 4.1 WARRANT SECTION

The warrant and speed section execute warrants daily. Special efforts to enhance the executing of warrants and to increase the payment rate are of the outmost importance to increase our payment rate. Warrants finalized were **63** during **March 2026** to the value of **R 79 550.00**

### 4.2. SPEEDING ENFORCEMENT

The four mobile cameras recorded **2846** cases, and the fixed sites recorded **2887** speeding cases **1989 cases** were recorded by the ASOD on the R27 (West Coast Road).

The total speeding offences for the month of **March 2026** were **7722**. We enhanced our speeding enforcement efforts to reduce accidents.

### 4.3. AUTOMATED NUMBER PLATE RECOGNITION OPERATIONS (ANPR OPERATIONS)

**Four (4)** ANPR operations were executed for the month of **March 2026**, and **R 64 800** of outstanding traffic fines were collected via this effort.

### 4.4 SAFETY AWARENESS

**Four (4)** Educational/Awareness program executed for the month of **March 2026**.

## 5. HIGHLIGHTS

- The management of the pig situation at small scale farmers is ongoing.
- We've received permission from DPP to erect new speeding cameras in Darling and Darling way Malmesbury.
- Our department are assisting SAPS with the Foot and Mouth Disease on a 24/7 basis.
- Our k9 supported Saps in an intelligence driven operations with Saps is ongoing

- The identifying and breaking down of illegal structures across the Swartland is ongoing.
- We had a successful Easter Plan which was well executed.
- The submitting of bi-weekly drone report monitoring illegal structures and land grabbing.
- On a regular basis attend all CPF meetings of all 4 Saps stations.
- Our efforts to collect outstanding fines through our ANPR system is increasing.
- Our K9 and LEAP Units are very successful in their efforts to prevent crime within our area of jurisdiction and are supporting SAPS in this fight as per our CSF agreement.
- Successes and operations with the WCLA which is ongoing.
- We enhance our efforts to deal with bylaws promptly and dealing with stray animals, illegal dumping and traffic related issues effectively.
- The registrations and monitoring of Spaza shops relating to operating hours within the Swartland is ongoing.
- We continue with our meetings and planning with all safety structures to create a safe environment for all within Swartland.
- Working with SAPS and other stakeholders brought great successes and good integrated collaboration with crime prevention initiatives.

## **6. CHALLENGES**

- The non-compliance of pedestrians crossing the N7 – is still a risk and intervention is planned with all the stakeholders.
- The overall behaviour and lawlessness of citizen's w.r.t laws and regulations.
- The constant gang related activities within our areas.
- The selling and consuming of alcohol lead to gender base violence and crime.
- The overall lawlessness of community's w.r.t Municipal Bylaws.
- Massive decline in the passing rate of learners licences after the implementation of the computerized learner license system.
- The illicit use of drugs and transporting thereof on our main routes (R27 and N7)

Swartland Municipality participated in the Institute of Municipal Public Safety's Western Cape (IMPS WC) meeting held in Riversdal over the period 10 to 12 February 2026. Representing Swartland Municipality were Mr R Steyn, MMC Warnick and Mr. Uys Van der Westhuijzen. The meeting was chaired by MMC Councillor van Dyk, Portfolio Chairperson of Community Safety from Mossel Bay Municipality.

## MINUTES:

### FOR THE PROGRAMME OF: 10, 11 & 12 February 2026

#### DAY 1

##### **Opening and Welcome**

The session opened with logistical announcements regarding Wi-Fi access and technical assistance.

A tribute was delivered in honor of Late Director Neville Michaels, acknowledging his leadership, mentorship, and contribution to community safety and EMS structures. A moment of silence was observed.

##### **Prayer and Orientation**

A prayer was delivered, followed by opening remarks from the Chairperson, MMC Councillor van Dyk, who outlined the purpose of the three-day conference and gave an overview of the program.

#### **Topic Number 1: Transport & Mobility (See presentation)**

**Presenter: Minister Isaac Sileku**

The Minister emphasized collaborative road safety efforts, challenges during the festive season, public transport safety concerns, and the importance of legislative changes. Updates were provided on AAARTO postponement, enforcement pressures, and intergovernmental cooperation.

##### **Legal and Regulatory Updates:**

Officials presented updates on legal appeals, RTMC-related matters, National Traffic Amendment Bill regulations, and upcoming processes for driving school registration, licensing plates, and compliance oversight.

### **Festive Season Report**

A detailed report was delivered on festive season traffic operations, highlighting high visibility patrols, integrated enforcement, pedestrian safety interventions, and challenges such as increased traffic volumes and staffing shortages. Fatality statistics showed increases across the province.

### **EMS and Municipal Collaboration**

Municipal managers were urged to improve LETCOM reporting accuracy, resource allocation, and cross-boundary support. Emphasis was placed on strengthening collaborative operations during peak travel periods.

### **Discussion and Questions**

Participants raised issues including PRDP requirements, pedestrian safety legislation, collaborative enforcement strategies, public transport compliance, and operational challenges. The Minister provided responses and committed to legislative reviews and improved cooperative frameworks.

### **Topic Number 2: Ombudsman (See presentation)**

**Presenter: Ret. General Reddy**

General Reddy presented on the Western Cape Police Ombudsman mandate, alternative dispute resolution mechanisms, and plans to strengthen presence in rural areas through community partnerships and accredited representatives.

### **Topic Number 3: IMPS-WC (See presentation)**

**Presenter: MMC Leon van Dyk**

#### **IMPS Background and Progress**

The committee outlined the origins, growth, and current national and provincial recognition of IMPS. Key highlights included constitutional finalization, SALGA engagement, SAPS representation, and alignment with government safety structures.

#### **Organizational Structure**

The IMPS committee consists of elected officials, administrators, SAPS representatives, SALGA members, and seven workstream coordinators. The current committee's term will be extended until after the 2026 elections.

### **Key Achievements**

Achievements include peace officer appointment clarifications, extension of powers submissions, MOUs for K9 deployment, SAPS information-sharing directives, and participation in provincial safety councils.

### **Challenges Identified**

Issues discussed included municipal staffing regulations, inconsistencies in HR interpretations, EB license requirements, career progression blockages, and limited training access for B-municipalities.

### **Membership Fees Presentation**

A revised fee structure was presented for municipalities, districts, POPS, and associate members. Implementation begins 1 March 2026, with council items to follow.

### **Training and Curriculum Update**

Updates included peace officer training, tactical survival training, and the new RTMC traffic warden qualification. Concerns were raised about impacts on B-municipalities lacking resources.

### **Discussion Session**

Questions covered firearm policies, RTMC employment conditions, IMPS membership rollout timelines, and MOU durations. Subject matter experts provided clarifications.

## **Topic Number 3: IMPS-WC (See presentation)**

**Presenter: Mr Carl Kuun**

Mr Kuun introduced advanced drone capabilities for fire management, law enforcement surveillance, SAR, infrastructure monitoring, and disaster response. Live demonstration scheduled for the evening session.

### **Adjournment**

The session adjourned for the mayoral dinner at 18:00, followed by practical drone demonstrations at the sports stadium.

## **DAY 2**

### **Opening and Welcome**

Mr Kitching and Mr van Dyk welcomes all delegates to day two of the conference and opens day two of the conference with prayer. Day 2 commenced with notices regarding questions and the program format. Delegates were informed that questions would be taken collectively at the end of all presentations.

### **Topic Number 4: Social Development (See Presentation)**

**Presenter: Ms Leana Goosen**

#### **Overview by DSD Leadership**

The Chief Director for Social Welfare and Restorative Services outlined the legislative and operational mandate of DSD relating to child and youth care centres (CYCCs), substance abuse programs, and victim empowerment services.

#### **Levels of Care for Children**

DSD explained the four legislated levels of care: Level 1 (family-based care), Level 2 (NGO-run CYCCs), Level 3 (DSD-run centres for high-risk children), and Level 4 (youth in conflict with the law). Additional specialized centres include assessment centres (ROAR), disability care centres, and child substance treatment facilities.

#### **Registered and Unregistered Centres**

The Western Cape currently has 53 registered NGO CYCCs and 9 DSD-operated facilities. Unregistered centres remain a significant risk, often involving human rights violations. Municipalities were urged to apply bylaws, zoning and health regulations to close unregistered centres, as DSD cannot legally enforce closure.

#### **Funding and Capacity Challenges**

DSD funds CYCCs but faces budget constraints, with less than 1% annual increases. NGOs struggle to cover utility costs, and municipalities were encouraged to consider rebates or relief measures. DSD emphasized its mandate to prioritize child protection above all other services.

#### **Independent Living Program**

A new initiative supports young adults exiting CYCCs (18–21 years) by placing them in supervised shared housing to prevent regression into vulnerable living conditions. Municipalities may support by providing suitable housing options.

#### **Substance Abuse Program Overview**

DSD funds prevention, early intervention, community-based and inpatient treatment services. All treatment centres must be registered with DSD. Municipalities play a statutory role in zoning, land-use approval, building plans, health and fire compliance, and bylaw enforcement.

### **Mapping of Services**

Eden/ Garden Route region includes funded services via SANCA, SEED, and Knysna Alcohol & Drug Centre. A number of unregistered facilities were identified, particularly in Mossel Bay, Oudtshoorn, Knysna, and George.

### **Local Drug Action Committees (LDACs)**

LDACs operate within all municipal areas to implement the National Drug Master Plan through local action plans, coordination and annual reporting.

### **Victim Empowerment Program**

Services include shelters, psycho-social support and legal referrals for adult victims of GBV. Various categories of shelters were outlined, including emergency shelters, first-stage shelters, second-stage shelters and accredited trafficking shelters.

### **Human Trafficking Awareness**

DSD highlighted rising cases involving organized syndicates recruiting South Africans for forced labor abroad. The TIP (Trafficking in Persons) Act requires three indicators: act, means and purpose. Municipal frontline staff, safety ambassadors and enforcement personnel should be trained to identify trafficking.

### **Reporting and Response Process**

Suspected trafficking must be reported immediately to SAPS under Section 19 of the TIP Act. DSD handles victim assessment, shelter placement, and issues letters of recognition enabling access to services.

### **Municipal Roles in Anti-Trafficking**

Municipalities should ensure training of frontline staff, community awareness campaigns, reporting suspicious behavior, enforcing zoning for shelters and treatment centres, and supporting DSD's prevention efforts.

### **Hotline and Critical Contacts**

Human Trafficking Hotline: 0800 222 777. SAPS DPCI (Hawks) in the Garden Route region can be activated immediately via hotline escalation.

### **Closing Remarks**

DSD acknowledged severe budget pressures but reaffirmed commitment to child protection and restorative services. Municipalities were encouraged to collaborate closely, particularly regarding bylaws, zoning, housing, and the identification of trafficking cases.

## **Topic Number 5: Copper Theft (See presentation)**

**Presenter: Captain Heunis**

### **Introduction**

Captain Heunis delivered a comprehensive presentation focused on copper theft trends, challenges, and operational responses across the Garden Route District. The session aimed to inform municipalities of key patterns and required collaborative interventions.

### **Geographic and Operational Context**

The Garden Route District includes seven municipalities, 21 police stations, and 10 satellite stations. SAPS manages vast rural and urban areas, making copper theft investigations resource-intensive.

### **Stakeholders and Role Players**

Copper theft enforcement requires collaboration between SAPS, municipal law enforcement, security companies, farmer/farm watch groups, Neighbourhood structures, and utility entities such as Eskom and telecommunications providers.

### **Legal and Procedural Challenges**

Captain Heunis highlighted significant loopholes in the Second-Hand Goods Act (Act 6 of 2009). Vehicles may operate as mobile scrap collectors if registered, allowing them to travel across precincts unhindered. Scrap dealers exploit valuation thresholds by splitting stolen copper into small amounts to avoid documented transactions.

### **Movement of Stolen Copper**

Stolen copper is often transported via foreign-registered vehicles, small trucks, or taxis, later consolidated into bigger loads destined for other provinces or border crossings. ANPR cameras detect suspicious vehicles entering and leaving the district at night.

### **Case Studies and Operational Successes**

Multiple seizures were made in Bredasdorp, Oubaai, Botlierskop, Oudtshoorn, and Mossel Bay. Farmwatch groups and K9 units played a critical role in arrests. Examples included stolen cellphone tower batteries, irrigation pipes, solar panels, and railway infrastructure.

### **Infrastructure Impact**

Copper theft causes major service disruptions: loss of mobile network coverage, irrigation damage, railway signal failure, streetlight outages, and compromised emergency communications. Replacement costs far exceed the value thieves obtain.

### **Emerging Trends**

Increased theft of air-conditioning units for copper coils, stripping of farm equipment, targeting of telecom VN boxes and battery cabinets, and use of corrugated-sheet hideouts in informal areas. Syndicates often involve foreign nationals.

### **Use of Technology (ANPR Cameras)**

Municipalities were urged to submit details of suspicious vehicles for ANPR loading. Only authorized personnel may view the system to prevent information leaks.

### **Multi-Agency Collaboration**

SAPS, law enforcement, traffic officers, farmwatch groups, and Neighbourhood watches share intelligence and conduct joint operations at weighbridges, intersections, and district borders.

### **Requests to Municipalities**

- Enforce scrapyards bylaws.
- Improve camera networks.
- Participate in intelligence forums.
- Support joint operations.
- Address illegal scrapyards.

### **Conclusion**

Copper theft remains a significant economic and service-delivery threat. SAPS requested enhanced partnership with municipalities and proactive resource deployment to mitigate losses.

## **Topic Number 6: Finance (See presentation)**

**Presenter: Mr Dian Cronje**

### **Introduction**

The Provincial Treasury delivered a financial overview for the 2024/25 municipal financial year, highlighting aggregated data trends across all 30 Western Cape municipalities.

### **Data Context and Methodology**

The presentation was based on consolidated mSCOA financial data submitted by municipalities. While minor anomalies may exist, the dataset is credible and used for official analysis.

### **Consumer Financial Pressure**

The Provincial Treasury noted that rising inflation and stagnant income levels have reduced household disposable income. Despite this, municipal consumer debt decreased by 5.3%, suggesting either improved payment culture or stronger enforcement.

### **Organs of State Debt Concerns**

Debt owed by national and provincial departments almost doubled, representing 23.5% of all outstanding municipal debt. Most of this debt is older than 90 days and remains a serious fiscal risk.

### **Revenue Collection Performance**

Municipalities achieved an aggregate collection rate of 101% of billed revenue. However, only 10 of the 25 local municipalities achieved the targeted 95% collection rate for consumer accounts.

### **Trends in Bad Debt Provisioning**

Despite reductions in outstanding debt, municipalities increased impairment provisions, reflecting a cautious approach to future non-payment risks.

### **Revenue Composition**

Service charges account for ±50% of revenue, with electricity alone comprising 70% of all service-charge income. Property rates contribute roughly 18%. This high reliance on electricity poses long-term sustainability concerns.

### **Cost-Reflective Tariffs**

Electricity remains the only trading service generating a surplus. Water, wastewater, and refuse services operate at significant deficits, forcing municipalities to cross-subsidise from electricity revenue.

### **Risks to Long-Term Sustainability**

Wastewater services show growing operating losses, posing major risks given current drought and water scarcity conditions. Municipalities may face capital funding challenges if trends persist.

### **Political and Affordability Pressures**

Election-year pressures often discourage councils from adjusting property rates. However, the data indicates that rates income must grow to reduce reliance on unstable revenue sources.

### **Operating Expenditure Trends**

Municipalities spent 96% of operational budgets, indicating strong service delivery performance. Major cost drivers were employee-related costs and bulk electricity purchases.

### **Bulk Purchase Cost Escalation**

NERSA increases (e.g., 12.74% rise) continue to exceed CPI, placing strain on municipal budgets. These unavoidable upstream costs must be passed through to consumers.

### **Employee Cost Pressures**

Employee costs rose 10.9%, influenced by collective bargaining outcomes and notch increases that remain outside municipal control.

### **Capital Budget Funding**

Borrowings doubled as a share of capital financing, a positive trend for long-term asset development. However, internally generated funds dropped by 50%, reflecting shrinking operational surpluses.

### **Capital Spend Performance**

Municipalities spent 84.6% of their capital budgets—a strong improvement in planning and project implementation.

### **1Repairs and Maintenance Decline**

Despite increased capital spending, repairs and maintenance expenditure is decreasing, risking long-term asset degradation and reduced lifespan of infrastructure.

### **Unfunded Budgets**

Seven municipalities previously tabled unfunded budgets. After support from Provincial Treasury, only three remained unfunded—all under mandatory Financial Recovery Plans.

## **Audit Outcomes**

Of 257 municipalities nationwide, only 41 received clean audits. Twenty of these were in the Western Cape, reflecting strong governance and financial management compared to the rest of the country.

## **Traffic Revenue Collection Statistics**

Municipalities issued approximately R3 billion in traffic fines but collected only 21%. Provincial traffic authorities collected only 6% of fines issued. The upcoming AAARTO rollout is expected to significantly affect future revenue streams.

## **Conclusion**

The Provincial Treasury highlighted that Western Cape municipalities remain financially resilient but face increased risks from declining electricity surpluses, rising bulk costs, political rate-setting pressures, and asset maintenance backlogs. Municipal councils were urged to use the financial publication for informed decision-making.

## **Finance: Procurement & SCM Presentation**

**Presenter: Santie Roy**

### **Introduction**

The Provincial Treasury Supply Chain Management (SCM) Directorate delivered a presentation on procurement challenges, strategic sourcing, and upcoming reforms under the Public Procurement Act. The speaker highlighted the need to modernize procurement practices and improve service delivery outcomes.

### **Current Procurement Challenges**

Municipalities face delays, complex processes, high costs, inconsistent quality, limited local sourcing, limited supplier performance management, and long lead times. Many procurement processes remain reactive rather than proactively planned.

### **Importance of Strategic Procurement**

The SCM Directorate emphasized shifting towards strategic, lifecycle-focused procurement. Desired outcomes include cross-functional teams, improved value-for-money decisions, enhanced supplier relationships, and reduced duplication across municipalities.

### **Government as an Integrated System**

A metaphor was used comparing government to Swiss cheese—procurement is responsible for filling service delivery gaps by sourcing what government cannot deliver internally. Effective procurement therefore directly influences public service outcomes.

### **Introduction to Strategic/Collective Procurement**

The speaker discussed the revival of collective purchasing models, including transversal contracts. Historically, the Western Cape used shared contracts (e.g. stationery), but decentralization resulted in inefficiencies and duplication. The new approach aims to consolidate needs, reduce costs, and leverage economies of scale.

## **Public Procurement Act – Expected Changes**

The Act was promulgated in 2023 but is not yet operational. Draft regulations will soon be shared with municipalities. The Western Cape Provincial Treasury hopes to be delegated authority to procure on behalf of municipalities—currently only national transversal contracts may be used by municipalities.

## **Municipal Access to National Transversal Contracts**

Many municipalities do not participate in national contracts due to misconceptions, including fear of audit findings for “piggybacking.” National Treasury has clarified that participation is allowed with written approval. Provincial Treasury offered support to municipalities needing assistance.

## **Items Municipalities Struggle to Procure**

Delegates identified procurement challenges for: dog food, uniforms, boots, tactical gear, weapon lubricants, drones, lights, CTTV/technology, purpose-built vehicles, spares, tyres, pouches, crime scene equipment and vehicle fit-outs.

## **National Transversal Contracts Relevant to Public Safety**

The following national contracts were recommended for immediate uptake:

- RT4 – Ambulance & rescue equipment (cutters, rams, spreaders).
- RT23 – Lubricating oils (vehicles & weapons).
- RT45 – Vehicle parts (multiple makes/models).
- RT57 – Vehicles, including customization & livery.
- RT59 – Footwear.
- RT64 – Clothing & uniforms (renewal underway).
- RT66 – Tactical & crime scene equipment (critical).
- RT69 – Tyres & tubes (delivery included).
- RT70 – Bulk fuel delivery for tanks  $\geq 1000$  litres.

## **RT66 – Tactical Equipment Contract**

This newly awarded contract includes batons, body armor, bullet traps, eyewear, gloves, handcuffs, helmets, holsters, pepper spray, tactical jackets, weapon retention equipment, shields, crime scene materials, torches and weapon sets. Municipal participation is low, with Rustenburg the only current participant.

## **Support Offered to Municipalities**

Provincial Treasury committed to assisting municipalities with accessing transversal contracts, writing to National Treasury for approval, and resolving supplier performance issues on existing contracts.

## **Planning for Future Provincial Contracts**

The Directorate invited municipalities to identify gaps not covered by national contracts to support the design of future provincial collective procurement initiatives once delegation is granted under the new Act.

## **Conclusion**

The session encouraged stronger collaboration, long-term planning, and shared procurement mechanisms to improve efficiency, reduce costs, and enhance service delivery capacity across the Western Cape.

## **Topic Number 7: South African Police (See presentation)**

**Presenter: Major General Jojo**

### **Opening & Welcome**

The session opened with greetings to all senior management and stakeholders. General Jojo was introduced and thanked for his attendance and contribution.

### **Background by General Jojo**

- General Jojo explained he started his role in January 2025 and has felt that stakeholder alignment has been lacking.
- He emphasized that stakeholders are not operating collectively, resulting in operational stagnation.
- His attendance at this platform was motivated by guidance from colleagues who assured him that this forum drives real action.
- He expressed appreciation for the support received and said the forum provides renewed encouragement.

### **Key Challenges Identified**

#### Stakeholder Non-Participation

- Stakeholders (municipalities, departments, district offices) are not consistently available to support SAPS operations, especially in rural communities.
- Law enforcement often responds alone to situations that require multi-departmental involvement.
- This results in community frustration as complaints escalate to SAPS, even in cases outside SAPS mandate.

#### Disjointed Government Structures

- SAPS is experiencing operational strain because provincial, district and local authorities are not aligned.
- Cross-department engagement is insufficient at ground level.

### **Operational and Legal Concerns**

#### Arrests & Detention – Legal Vulnerabilities

- Recent incidents highlighted the risk of unlawful arrest and detention, especially when:
  - Bylaws are unclear,
  - Contraventions are not properly defined, or
  - Legal authority of officers is questionable.
- Example: Traffic officers detained a group of lawyers and doctors travelling at high speed. Although evidence existed (speed >180 km/h), the court dismissed key aspects due to procedure and interpretation.
- Civil claims arising from improper arrest decisions are costing SAPS significant money, and individual members may be held financially liable.

## Bylaw Limitations

Many offences (e.g., drunk and disorderly behaviour) cannot result in lawful arrest because bylaws do not prescribe:

- Penalties,
- Offence categories, or
- Specific legal definitions.

SAPS stressed that bylaws must be updated to avoid legal challenges.

## Peace Officer Certificate Applications

General Jojo explained the requirements under Section 34 of the Criminal Procedure Act:

- The Minister may designate persons as Peace Officers within specified areas.
- Employers must motivate why officers require peace-officer status.
- Challenges:
  - Some municipal functions (e.g., fire, housing enforcement) are not included in existing categories.
  - Five-day training programmes do not automatically qualify officers.
- A proposal was made to:
  - Engage national structures,
  - Amend Gazette notices, and
  - Formalize categories to prevent operational gaps.

## Cross-Border Enforcement Problems

- Law enforcement is restricted to their municipalities; this creates major difficulties for:
  - Crime scenes,
  - Protests (toy-toys),
  - Rural operations requiring immediate support.
- Some temporary authorizations were issued (e.g., Sand Land incident), but:
  - These were time-limited,
  - Not sustainable or efficient.

## Proposal

- Develop a province-wide MOU allowing:
  - Cross-border assistance,
  - Seamless joint operations,
  - Provincial legal alignment.
- Legal Services must be part of the drafting team to ensure compliance.

## Training Requirements

First responders (often municipal law enforcement) frequently arrive at scenes before SAPS.

Concerns:

- Crime scenes get contaminated,
- Evidence becomes unusable in court,

- Officers lack unified training protocols.
- A proposal was made to create joint, province-wide SAPS–Law Enforcement training, including:
  - Crime-scene management,
  - Protest action handling,
  - Evidence preservation.
- PC and Deputy Commissioners have already approved drafting a training plan.

### **Theft of Cables – Court Challenges**

Many cable-theft cases are thrown out of court because:

- Stolen cables are not marked,
- Municipal owners cannot prove ownership,
- Accused persons claim the cables belong to them.

Request:

- Municipalities must mark and uniquely identify all infrastructure cables.
- This enables SAPS to prove ownership and secure prosecution.

### **Requests from SAPS to Stakeholders**

- Strengthen attendance and participation at rural engagements.
- Update and clarify municipal bylaws.
- Provide motivated letters for peace-officer certification.
- Collaborate on the provincial MOU for cross-border enforcement.
- Support SAPS in training initiatives.
- Ensure cable infrastructure is properly marked.

### **Closing**

General Jojo closed with:

- Appreciation for the opportunity to engage,
- A call for urgency,
- A reminder that without full partnership, policing alone will not succeed.

## **Topic Number 8: Lateral Solutions Academy (See presentation)**

### **Presenter:**

- Arthur – Curriculum Developer
- Mark– CEO, Lateral Solutions
- Charlie – Pre-Acto (Accreditation & Digital Platform Lead)

### **Opening & Welcome**

The session opened with greetings and a thank-you to the Western Cape for the invitation.

Delegates were informed that questions would be addressed at the end of the presentation.

A QR code was made available to download the full curriculum summary and presentation materials.

### **Background to the Curriculum Development**

#### **Origin of the Initiative**

- Two years ago, Mark Swinow, CEO of Lateral Solutions, approached Arthur to develop a tailor-made municipal law-enforcement training curriculum.
- The purpose: to build a comprehensive, high-quality training programme specifically addressing the evolving roles and risks faced by municipal law enforcement officers.
- Arthur admitted the team initially underestimated the complexity, cost, and scale of the project.

#### **Mandate**

- Mark's instruction: *"We must do this properly or not at all"*
- The team aimed to produce a curriculum exceeding all expectations and designed to withstand legal, operational, and academic scrutiny.

### **About Lateral Solutions**

Lateral Solutions is a global provider of protection, security, and specialised training services, operating in:

- South Africa
- UAE
- India
- United Kingdom
- Mark shared this project is not merely commercial — it is a community legacy initiative, inspired by concerns about crime, community safety, and the need to uplift local municipal enforcement capabilities.

## **Approach to Curriculum Development**

### **Research & Foundation**

- Curriculum development was based on:
- Job descriptions from Western Cape and other municipalities.
- Real-world policing experience, including Arthur's national and international training background.
- Because legal and tactical concepts can be abstract for new recruits, the curriculum centres on scenario-based training, supported by:
  - Practical exercises
  - Simulated role-play
  - Video scenarios
  - Group debriefings and analysis

### **External Verification**

- A criminal-law advocate and an academic advisor were appointed to:
- Validate the curriculum structure and content
- Ensure legal accuracy
- Ensure future defensibility of the curriculum in court
- The curriculum was submitted to Mayfield International, the world's largest academic accreditation service, and received accreditation in November 2024.

## **Introduction of Key Team Members**

### **Mark – CEO**

- Founder and visionary behind the project.
- Motivated to uplift municipal law enforcement after witnessing the challenges they face as first responders to unrest, taxi violence, and organised crime.

### **Jay Ackerman – Tactical Specialist**

- Former British Army Parachute Regiment and SAS operator.
- Provides tactical expertise, preparing officers for high-risk environments.
- Supports development of modules reflecting the reality that municipal officers now regularly confront violent crime.

### **Advocate Sarita Human – Legal Specialist**

- Former SAPS Colonel, now a criminal-law advocate.
- Ensures legal compliance, accurate interpretation of criminal procedure, and high-quality academic content.

### **Dr Louise Engelbrecht – Academic Advisor**

- Ensures accreditation compliance and proper structuring for QCTO and national academic requirements.

### **Charlie - Digital Platform & Accreditation**

- Leads implementation of the LMS, digitalisation of qualifications, and alignment with QCTO requirements.

- Leadership shortcomings have been repeatedly criticised in boards of inquiry; this curriculum aims to correct that gap.

### **Topic Number 10: State Vet (See presentation)**

**Presenter:** Dr Willem Burger

#### **Foot-and-Mouth Disease (FMD) Outbreak Briefing**

*Based on presentations and discussions captured in Dr Willem.docx*

Purpose of the Session

The meeting was convened to provide urgent updates on the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (FMD) outbreak affecting parts of the Western Cape, including the newly confirmed case in the Southern Cape (Mossel Bay/Hartenbos). Stakeholders across veterinary services, agriculture, law enforcement, and municipal structures were briefed on the disease, control measures, and required responses.

#### **Key Points**

##### **Disease Overview**

- FMD is a highly infectious viral disease affecting all cloven-hoofed animals.
- Transmission occurs mainly through contaminated vehicles, auctions, animal movements, mud, faeces, and water.
- Visible symptoms include severe hoof lesions and painful oral lesions, preventing normal movement and feeding.

### **Current Outbreak Status**

- First cases in the Western Cape originated up North, followed by a confirmed case in Mossel Bay/Hartenbos.
- Source of infection in the Southern Cape remains unknown, though informal livestock movement is a suspected contributor.

### **Provincial Response**

- The Western Cape Minister of Agriculture activated a 21-point provincial action plan.
- The province successfully secured additional vaccines for outbreak containment, which are critical for immediate response.
- Strong emphasis placed on public–private cooperation to enhance effectiveness.

### **Control Zones & Testing**

- A 10 km control zone has been established around the affected farm.
- Intensive veterinary inspections include mouth and hoof examinations of all cattle within the 3 km and 10 km zones.
- Five control points now monitor all movement out of the hotspot zone.

### **Movement Control Requirements**

Strict livestock movement regulations were reinforced:

- Veterinary declaration forms
- Schedule 6 and 8 transport permits
- Health certificates
- Mandatory branding and ear tagging
- Biosecurity declarations following auctions.
- No animals may move from the 3 km infected core zone.

### **Risks Identified**

- Auctions remain one of the highest transmission risks.
- Feed transport trucks pose contamination risk through mud/feces on vehicles.
- Informal farmers and roaming livestock are a significant concern for uncontrolled spread.
- Wildlife movement presents a low but notable risk.

### **Responsibilities & Costs**

- Livestock owners are responsible for disinfectants, biosecurity equipment, and containment measures on their farms.
- Municipalities are not responsible for purchasing disinfectants or setting up wash stations.
- Only vaccines may be subsidized by the provincial government.

### **Disinfectants & Biosecurity**

- F10 is the most widely recommended disinfectant for FMD (must be labelled for FMD).
- Farms must establish proper vehicle and footwear disinfection points.
- Movement into farms must adhere to strict biosecurity protocols.

### **Communication & Community Engagement**

Significant community confusion and anxiety have been reported.

Key needs identified:

- Clear and consistent public communication
- Guidance for informal farmers
- Use of CPFs, churches, neighbourhood watches to reach rural communities
- Development of simple, accessible infographics explaining FMD risks and protocols

### **Conclusion**

The Western Cape remains one of the few provinces with effective, coordinated management of FMD outbreaks. Success depends on:

- Strict movement control
- Rapid vaccination rollout
- High biosecurity compliance
- Strong intergovernmental collaboration
- Effective communication with all farming communities

Continued vigilance, coordinated action, and immediate containment remain the most critical elements to prevent widespread economic and agricultural damage.

## **DAY 3**

### **Opening and Welcome**

The session commenced with the Programme Director welcoming all dignitaries and participants.

Attendees included:

- Honourable Minister Anroux Marais
- Executive Mayors and Deputy Mayors
- Senior SAPS Provincial Officials
- Chief Director of Provincial Traffic,
- Senior managers from local municipalities
- Provincial department representatives
- Stakeholders and invited guests

The Programme Director highlighted the value of the three-day engagement, noting it provided clarity, insight, and shared direction for strengthening safety responses in the Western Cape. He emphasized that the sessions were highly beneficial, not a waste of time, and had equipped participants with shared purpose moving forward.

### **Topic Number 11: Community Safety (See presentation)**

#### **Honorable Minister Anroux Marais**

The Minister thanked all municipalities, SAPS, and stakeholders for their ongoing collaboration, stressing the importance of practical engagement on safety priorities. Key points included:

Value of Municipal-Level Safety Platforms

- Municipalities are closest to communities, shaping citizens' safety experiences.
- Platforms like these strengthen a coordinated and standardized provincial safety approach.
- The Minister expressed appreciation to the hosting municipality for their hospitality and leadership.

Strengthening Law Enforcement Capacity

- The Western Cape Government remains committed to supporting municipalities to strengthen law enforcement capacity, noting visible improvements in crime reduction.
- The Minister reaffirmed that municipalities' work is making a tangible difference in communities.

Expanding Policing Powers

- The Minister reiterated the province's advocacy for expanded policing powers at provincial and municipal levels.
- Rationale: local policing of minor offences would allow SAPS to focus on gangsterism and organized crime.
- Municipalities must prepare capacity, infrastructure, and trained personnel to be ready when such powers are devolved.

Closing Remarks

The Minister thanked all participants for their commitment to building a structured, collaborative, and effective law enforcement model, reinforcing the Province's support to municipalities.

## **Western Cape Safety Plan**

**Presenter: Mrs. Amanda Dissel**

Ms Dissel presented the 2024/25 PNP Report, fulfilling the province's constitutional mandate to determine and submit policing priorities. This year's focus was on municipal law enforcement capacity, following consistent reports of resource shortages at local level.

### **Legislative Mandate**

- Provinces must compile PNPs to inform national policing policy.
- The Western Cape interprets PNP broadly, covering the whole-of-government and whole-of-society safety ecosystem.

### **Key Findings from the PNP Assessment**

#### **Crime & SAPS Resourcing**

- Western Cape recorded 4,369 murders, with 82% occurring in the City of Cape Town.
- SAPS staffing remains below establishment, with a police-to-population ratio of 1:429, worse than the national average.

#### **Municipal Law Enforcement Capacity**

- District municipalities have 434 law enforcement officers and 432 traffic officers collectively.
- The City of Cape Town far exceeds districts in resources, with more than 3,000 law enforcement staff, 476 traffic officials, and 1,276 LEAP officers.

#### **Infrastructure & Technology**

Municipalities generally face limited access to technology such as drones, ANPR cameras, CCTV, and communication systems. Rural municipalities struggle with vehicle shortages and challenging terrain.

#### **Key Challenges**

- Chronic budget constraints, especially for overtime and capital resources.
- Staff shortages affecting coverage beyond main towns.
- Lack of PPE, specialised units, and communication systems in many municipalities.
- High enforcement demands due to illegal taxi operations.

#### **Successes**

- Strong inter-agency collaboration (SAPS, Traffic, Home Affairs, CapeNature, neighbourhood and farm watches).
- Peace officer training has increased municipal capacity.
- Specialised units (K9, RU) have proven effective.
- Joint operational planning has improved enforcement impact.

## **Recommendations**

### **To Municipalities**

- Increase budgets for law enforcement and traffic services.
- Expand human resources and improve deployment during peak crime times (nights and weekends).
- Improve recruitment standards and ensure standardised training.

### **To Provincial Government**

- Continue to support training and capacity-building of municipal peace officers.
- Explore centralised procurement for standardized equipment.
- Strengthen oversight systems for municipal law enforcement, especially regarding use of force and firearm protocols.
- Support development of joint policies, operational procedures, and communication systems.

## **Conclusion**

The report confirms that while municipalities have made noteworthy progress in strengthening local enforcement, significant capacity gaps remain, especially in rural areas. The Western Cape Government remains committed to partnering with municipalities to implement PNP recommendations and enhance safety outcomes across the province. The challenge ahead lies in translating these recommendations into effective, sustainable implementation.

## **Status Update on WCG Safety Plan**

**Presenter: Mr. Hilton Arendse**

Day 3 of the provincial safety engagement featured a detailed and strategically significant presentation by Mr Hilton Arends, focusing on the Department's progress, safety priorities, and the practical implementation of the Western Cape's safety agenda. The presentation emphasized measurable results, strengthened municipal and provincial collaboration, and the urgent need for world-class responses to the province's high levels of violent crime.

### **Overview of Progress to Date**

Mr Arends reported on the Department's key achievements over recent years, particularly its largest investment: the Law Enforcement Advancement Plan (LEAP). LEAP currently employs over 1,000 officers, with provincial expenditure exceeding R350 million annually. Precincts were consolidated from 13 to six high-impact areas, resulting in a 5% reduction in murders within five months—contrasting the province's 0.6% increase over the same period.

Additionally, more than 210 LEAP officers have secured permanent City of Cape Town posts, supporting the Department's goal of long-term employment pathways for trained officers.

## **Strengthening Municipal & Rural Safety**

### **Law Enforcement & K9 Capacity**

Municipalities continue to request expanded K9 capacity. Existing K9 units operate in Overstrand and Swartland, with plans to strengthen Stellenbosch to match high-performing municipalities like Mossel Bay.

### **Peace Officer Training**

Twenty-eight additional enforcement officers were trained across 24 green municipalities, with more training planned. The Chrysalis Academy produced 651 graduates, all successfully placed in contract roles—highlighting the programme’s success but also the need for sustainable, permanent posts.

## **Technology, SAPS Support & Firearms Strategy**

### **ShotSpotter Expansion**

The gunshot detection pilot demonstrated significant success and has expanded from four to nine precincts. This supports evidence-based, time-specific and hotspot-driven policing.

### **Improving SAPS Detective Services**

The Province is working with SAPS to:

- Improve detectives’ access to laptops and technology
- Support certification and affidavit services to reduce SAPS admin burden
- Enhance the quality of statements and documentation

### **Firearm Disruption**

Strategies include:

- Centralised firearm destruction sites
- Targeted firearm recovery initiatives
- Community rewards for firearm-related intel

## **Community-Based Safety Structures**

### **Neighbourhood Watches (NHWs)**

- 516 accredited NHWs
- 346 supported with R3.4 million in resources

### **Community Policing Forums (CPFs)**

- 152 CPFs reconstituted
- Provincial teams facilitated numerous election processes

### **Violent Crime Context**

The province recorded 3,951 murders between April 2025 and mid-January 2026—averaging:

- 90.5 per week
- 12.9 per day
- One murder every two hours

Cape Town ranks among the world’s most violent cities, reinforcing the need for a world-class, intelligence-driven, multi-agency safety response.

## **Alignment to Provincial Safety Plan**

The Department's work fully aligns with the Provincial Strategic Plan, centred on:

1. Integrated Violence Prevention
2. Safe & Secure Communities
3. Responsive Law Enforcement

Each pillar includes targeted outcomes related to youth development, family support, community cohesion, public infrastructure security, and evidence-based policing.

## **Priority Projects Identified**

The Department will focus on:

### **Strengthened SAPS–Municipal Collaboration**

Formalised district-level agreements similar to the City of Cape Town model.

### **Integrated Technology Ecosystem**

Connecting municipal CCTV, ANPR, traffic cameras, and JOCs to ensure seamless real-time data flow.

### **Firearm Reduction Acceleration**

Expanding gunshot detection, firearm tracing, and destruction.

### **Rural & Municipal Safety**

Supporting rural law enforcement, CPFs, NHWs, and peace officers.

### **New Projects for 2026**

- Gang & Organized Crime Observatory
- Firearms & crime investigation capability
- Community Safety Communications Strategy
- Provincial Safety Summit (mid-2026)

## **Community Safety & Development Programme (Flagship Initiative)**

A transformative model launched in Windsor/Winchester aims to:

- Break silos between departments
- Empower communities to co-lead safety initiatives
- Improve employment pathways
- Create “safe zones” in high-risk neighbourhoods

Achievements so far include:

- A unified leadership structure selected through a transparent CV-based process
- Alignment of community plans with the Provincial Strategic Plan
- Reduction in community factionalism and improved cooperation

## **Strategic Direction & Conclusion**

Mr Arends concluded that the Province requires a world-class safety ecosystem—one that is data-driven, community-rooted, intelligence-supported, and collaboratively implemented. The

ultimate goal is long-term stability, reduced violent crime, and strengthened community resilience.

He emphasized that communities judge government by service delivery, not departmental boundaries—thus whole-of-government coordination is essential.

### **Topic Number 13: AAARTO (See presentation)**

**Presenter: MM Richard Bosman**

#### **Opening & Introductions**

The Programme Director introduced Mr Richard Bosman, a highly experienced former law enforcement professional, describing his long service background and passion for uniformed policing. His presentation focused on a highly sensitive topic: the implications and challenges of AARTO (Administrative Adjudication of Road Traffic Offences) for municipalities and provincial law enforcement structures.

#### **Background to AARTO Implementation**

Mr Bosman provided a recap of developments during the past year, particularly intense engagements dating back to 19 August, where concerns were first formally raised about AARTO's impact on local government.

Key Concerns Raised Since 2023

- Potential loss of revenue for municipalities.
- High cost of new systems and administrative structures required by AARTO.
- Absence of clarity on full regulatory requirements.
- Lack of testing and system integration by RTIA.

#### **Engagements with National and Provincial Structures**

##### **Meetings & Submissions**

- Municipalities (including Stellenbosch, Swartland, Cape Town, Mossel Bay, George, Hessequa) formed the "AARTO Seven" to draft consolidated objections.
- Multiple formal submissions were addressed to:
  - The President
  - The National Minister of Transport
  - RTIA
- Concerns included implementation dates, untested systems, unfunded mandates, and legal irregularities regarding regulations.

## **Key Milestones**

- 1 August: National Gazette issued implementation timelines.
- Municipalities rejected these timelines as unrealistic and uninformed.
- 16 October: Province facilitated engagement with RTIA at Gene Louw College; municipalities again raised unresolved concerns.
- 31 October: New regulations published, introducing new obligations not included in the 2020 draft — prompting further objections.

## **Suspension of Implementation**

- 8 November: Minister withdrew AARTO implementation dates, citing:
  - Municipalities were not ready
  - SAPS staff required training
- Mr Bosman confirmed these reasons originated from local governments, not national government.

## **Critical Issues Identified with AARTO**

### **Lack of Regulations**

- Essential regulations published on 31 October were withdrawn on 28 November, creating a regulatory vacuum.
- Without regulations:
  - Traffic officers cannot issue fines under AARTO.
  - Implementation becomes legally impossible.

### **SAPS Obligations Hidden in New Regulations**

- New regulations placed major training and administrative responsibilities on municipalities to train all SAPS officers in the Western Cape — approx. 30,000 personnel.
- This obligation was never part of the 2020 draft regulations.

### **Failure of National Entities to Meet Their Duties**

Key failures by RTIA/RTMC:

- No testing or integration of municipal systems.
- No procurement of required workstations, equipment, or handheld devices.
- Government Printing Works unable to produce necessary documents.
- SAPO (Post Office) unable to render required services; many branches closed, insolvency risk high.

## **Financial Implications for Municipalities**

### **Loss of Revenue**

#### **Under AARTO:**

- Fines paid within 32 days receive 50% discount.
- Fines paid after 32 days: RTIA receives 50% of the full amount.

**Municipalities carry:**

- All staff costs
- All admin costs
- All enforcement costs
- All system costs

**Result:**

- Municipalities projected to lose 50% of their annual fines income.

**Impact Examples**

- City of Cape Town could lose R150–R200 million per year.
- Smaller municipalities (e.g., Swellendam, Mossel Bay) also face severe proportional losses.

**Instalment Plans**

AARTO allows payment of fines in instalments over 6–12 months.

This creates:

- Budget instability
- Year-to-year revenue spillover
- Administrative backlog

**Parallel Systems Required****Municipalities would need to run:**

- Current Criminal Procedure Act (CPA) system
- New AARTO system
- In parallel for 18–24 months

**Doubling operational costs.****Operational & Legal Risks****Loss of Law Enforcement Powers**

Under AARTO, traffic officers:

- Lose ability to arrest individuals who refuse to provide personal details.
- Lose several procedural powers vested in the Criminal Procedure Act.
- Become “administrative officers” rather than peace officers.

**Administrative Burden**

Municipalities would have to:

- Maintain suspension registers
- Process licence card confiscations
- Administer representations
- Manage notice delivery and follow-ups

## **SAPS Dependency**

SAPS would rely on municipal systems for:

- Training
- Back-office support
- Notice processing

This is not reflected in SAPS' legal mandate.

## **Municipal Solidarity & Way Forward**

### **Western Cape AARTO Task Team**

A joint task team has been formed with:

- Chief Director (Province)
- Mr Bosman (Municipal representative)
- Senior municipal finance representatives

Tasks include:

- Drafting a comprehensive objection
- Securing engagement with the Director-General of Transport
- Protecting municipal financial sustainability

### **Next Steps**

- Awaiting formal DG meeting.
- Pending progress, municipalities are prepared to litigate if necessary.
- Strong message: "Do not implement AARTO until every concern is resolved."

### **Conclusion**

Mr Bosman reiterated:

- AARTO is not ready for implementation.
- It will disempower law enforcement officers.
- It poses a serious financial and administrative threat to municipalities.
- Municipalities must ask hard questions and avoid being forced into a dysfunctional system.
- Collective municipal action has already delayed implementation and must continue.

The presentation concluded with a brief Q&A session and an open invitation from Mr Bosman for ongoing engagement.
